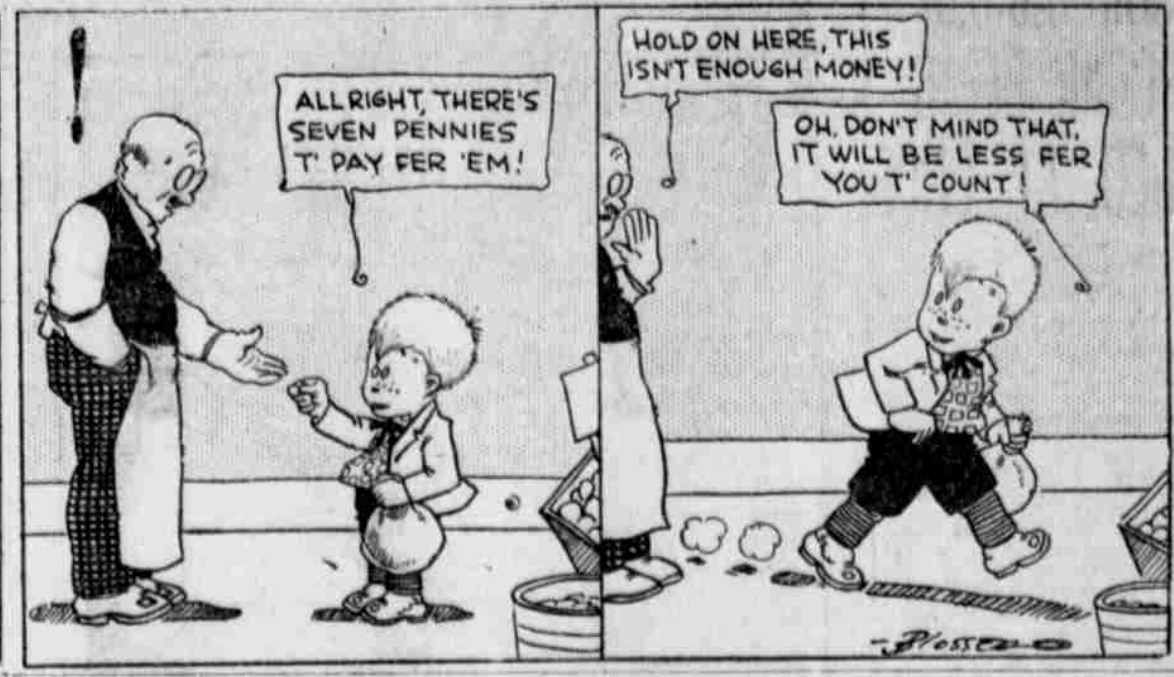
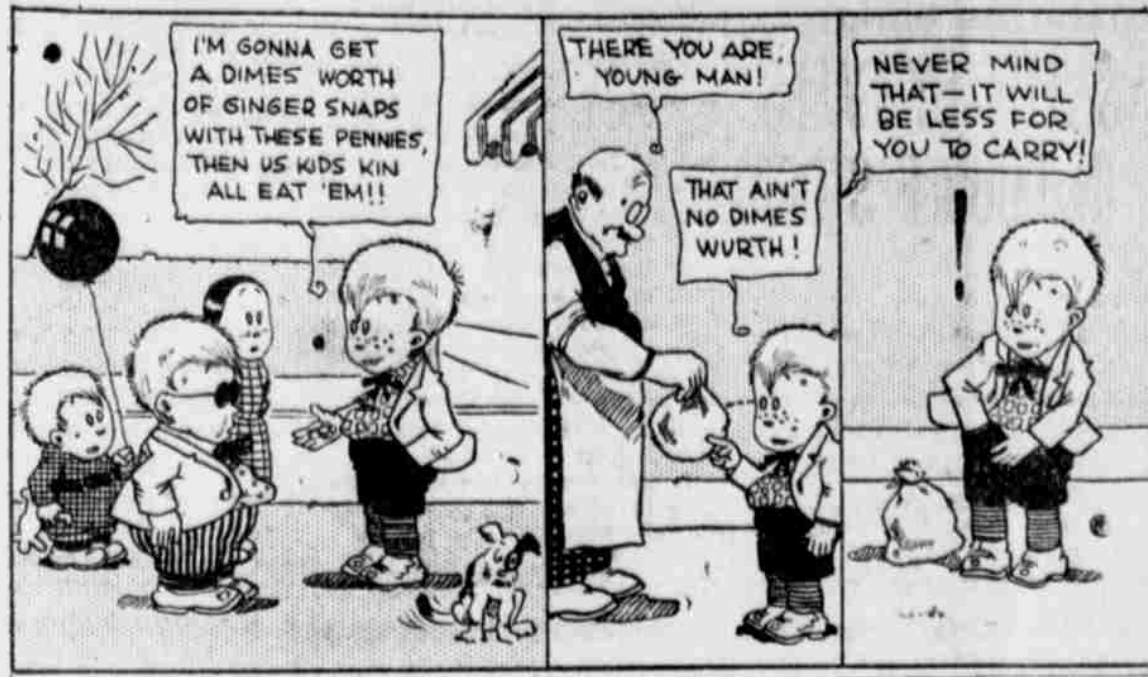
Mrs. Hugh Gillette left for San Francisco on Wednesday, accompanied by her daughter, Marion. Hugh may join them at the exposition city later on.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 19.—Without reaching agreement on any plan to submit to congress for the settlement of the Oregon-California land grant question and with provision for another meeting December 1, conference of representatives of the Southern Pacific company and a committee of the September land

grant conference adjourned this afternoon after a three hours discussion that at times became heated.

The railroad company was represented by Attorney Ralph Moody and Tax Expert McAllister. The state was represented by Governor Withycombe, Secretary of State Olcott, State Treasurer Kay, S. M. Garland of Lebanon, L. E. Bean of Eugene and W. I. Vawter of Medford. C. E. Spence of Oregon City who was appointed a member of the committee did not appear.

Failure to agree was caused by difference in interpretation of the resolution passed just before adjournment of the general conference in September which provided for the conference today to evolve a plan "whereby the co-operation of the Southern Pacific can be secured in opening the Oregon-California grant lands to early settlement without further litigation."
