60 BUSHELS WHEAT PER ACRE DRY YEAR **BY PROPER FARMING**

W. N. Campbell, whose 160-acro farm lies almost against Talent, in the old Auderson tract, the soil of which is of a type that ought to inspire any farmer to his best effort. reports that he harvested thirty three acres of fall wheat of the Litthe Club variety this year that yielded from ferty-five to sixty bushels to the acres. At the present price of good wheaf it is not difficult to figure Mr. Campbell's return in net profit from that harvest. He had : smaller acreage of spring wheat that didn't do so well by many bushels by reason of the drouth that overtook it in its prime growing season.

Mr. Campbell's best yield of fal wheat was produced on ground that had been cultivated to corn the previous year, showing the beneficial effect of rotation.

As evidence of the fact that a far mer who knows how to make the soil yield-and yield gladly-and has the energy to do it, need never have cause to complain of failure, it may be eited that Mr. Campbell's next crop of fall wheat is now growing nicely under the favor of recent showers and the manner in which he had prepared his field for the seed in the first place.


