Two years ago Mr. Campbell harvested quite an acreage of wild oats for horse feed. He obtained two and one-half tons to the acre and sold it, haled, for \$15 a ton.

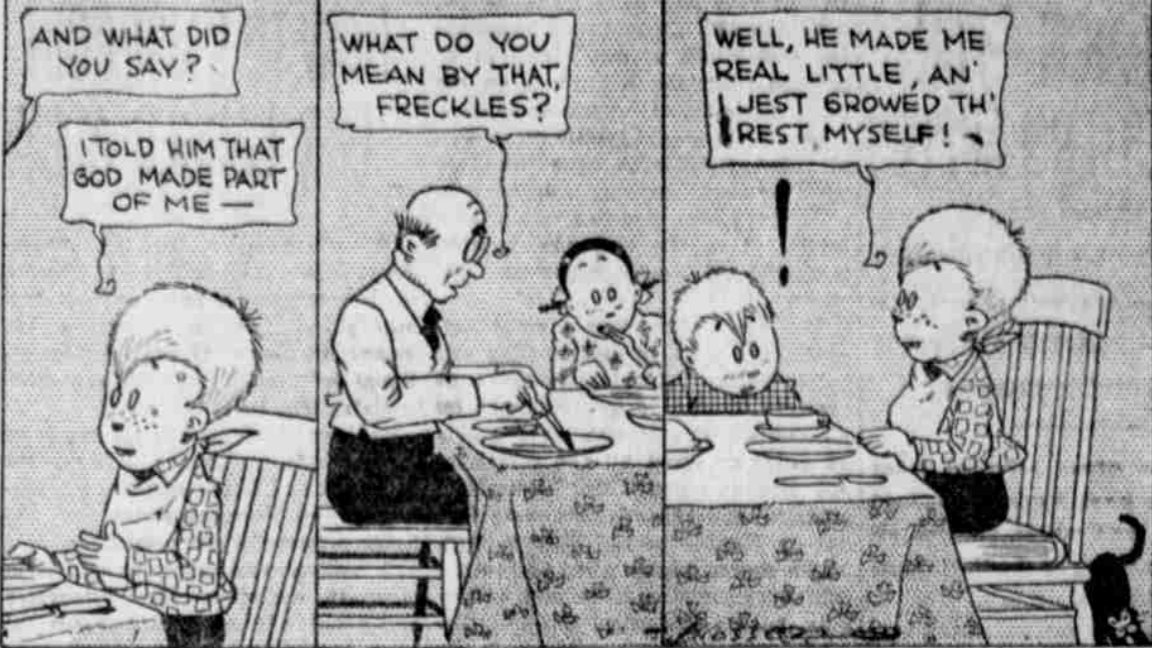
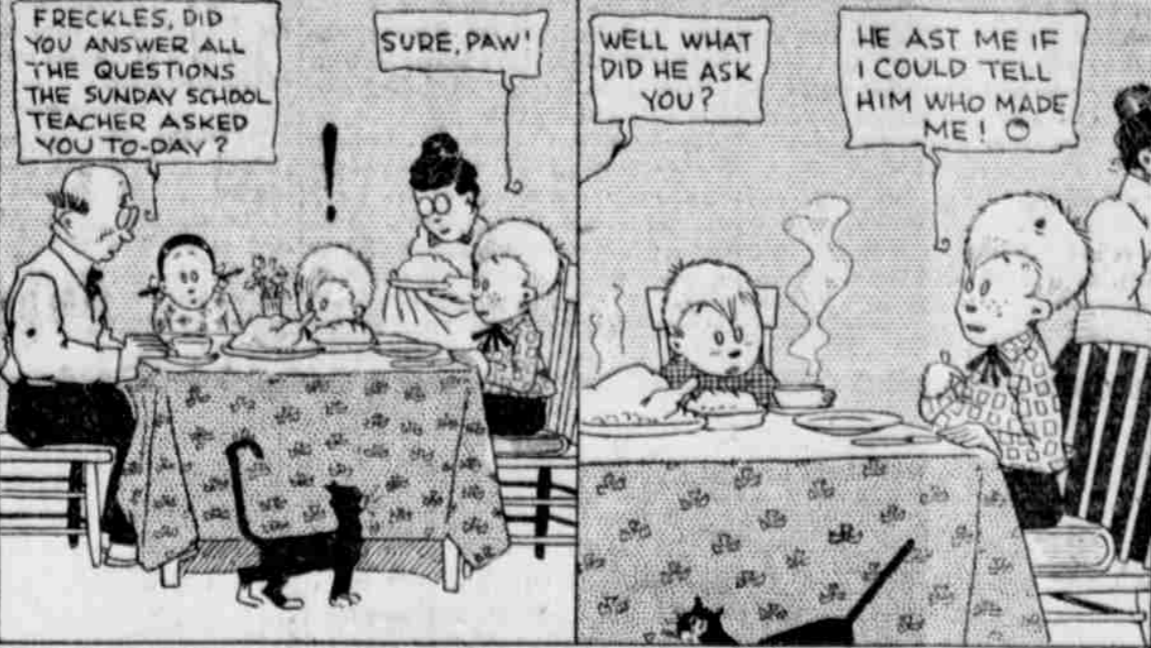

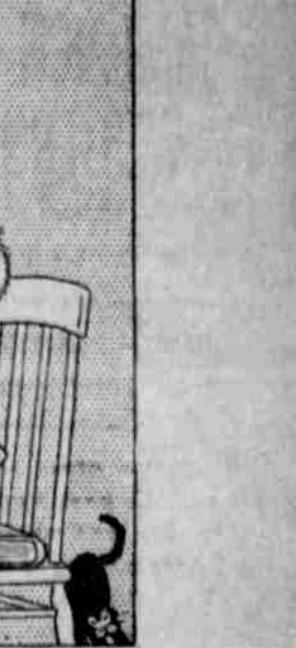
