

4000 YEARS BEHIND PRIMITIVE FARMERS OF EDEN'S GARDEN

After primitive man had realized a surfeit of wild nuts and herbs of the bramble and reflected that it was a scanty menu, he began to farm—in a simple way, to be sure, but it served to diversify his employment, and, finally, his daily dietary.

Only as farming progressed—in a limited way, we may be sure—and the products of the Garden of Eden began to justify its name. But progress was made, and, as it was stimulated ultimately by scientific processes in the growth of plants useful to man, irrigation, by practical use, came to be known as one of the vital potentials of successful agriculture.

In due time man became more aggressive; and then came troubles—tribal, racial, religious and political. They left the Garden of Eden in sorrowful decay.

This is a New Eden Let us not lose heart when we are told that the people of this Garden of Eden, the beautiful Rogue River valley, are more than four thousand years behind the primitive farmer of the valley of the Euphrates. But they are.

Out of the hills about the Eden of old came a river; and it watered a garden. The Bible tells us that—near our geographies confirm the story.

No, also, out of the hills about this new Eden flows a river; and it, too, shall water a garden just as fruitful, just as fertile, just as rich in its production of plants that are good for man.

Men with wooden shovels and tree-bark baskets built the first irrigation canals with which to extend and enrich the productive area of the Garden of Eden.

Some day we will do that here, in this new Garden of Eden; but we will do it by a different process and, let us hope, in less time. With our modern power-driven implements, massive and strengthening, it will be an easy task. It will not be a great project, except in effect, for latter-day invention has reduced its dimensions to those of a small job. That fact begets hope that it will be done.

The Old and the New Just now the government of Turkey—that portion of it that is not engaged in massacring somebody in Europe's mighty tragedy—is engaged in re-suscitating the life of the soil of the Garden of Eden. The first thing the wise men of the Turkish government did in this great reclamation project was to set aside a fund of several million dollars to use in the installation of a gigantic irrigation system.

No, let us find heart to nourish hope. Some day Rogue River valley will be irrigated; and then it will be in fact, as it is now in embryo, a real Garden of Eden. And the streams that flow out of the hills about it shall be made to water it, keeping it green with life and productive of rich harvest.

No more, then, shall poverty bring distress. No more shall drought bring loss. No more shall failure beget the mortgage. And no more shall the cry of fear and hunger come from the cottage on the farm.
