WELSH TO MEET WHITE 6 WEEKS IN TITLE BOUT

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Freddie Welsh of England and Charley White of Chicago, through their managers, signed an agreement here today to meet in a twenty-round bout within six weeks for the lightweight championship of the world. Welsh, as the champion, and White, as the challenger, agreed to meet before the club offering the best inducements, all bids for the bout to be received not later than Thursday, December 16. The pugilists agreed to weigh 135 at 2 p. m. on the afternoon of the battle if the contest is held in the evening, or 135 pounds at 10 a. m. in case it is fought during the afternoon. Their managers each posted \$1000 forfeit for-weight and further agreed to place an additional \$1500 each in the hands of the stakeholders for appearance at the time the bout is awarded to the club offering the best inducements. The terms of the agreement read that the boxers are to meet under Queensberry rules in a battle of twenty or more rounds with a referee's decision.

MERCHANTS SEEK NON PARTISAN TARIFF

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—John J. Fahey, president of the chamber of commerce of the United States, told President Wilson today that business men want congress to establish a nonpartisan tariff commission and provide means to strengthen the merchant marine. Mr. Fahey declared there was great need for more ships to carry the exports of the United States. The president told Mr. Fahey he was studying both questions very carefully.

ITALIAN TROOPS IN AVALONA TO BE INCREASED

PARIS, Dec. 2.—Detachments of Italian troops were landed in Avalona, Albania, on Tuesday, according to information from a reliable source in Athens, a dispatch to the Temps from the Greek capital today says: Although Avalona, in southern Albania on the Adriatic, has been under occupation by Italian troops for some months past, the statement that Italy is sending additional forces there may readily be taken to mean that they are intended for use in connection with the allied operations in the Balkans. Reports that Italy would take part in the Balkan campaign have been current for some time but no positive announcement that she would do so has been made.

SUNDAY PAPERS UPHELD; VITAL VALUE FOR WEEK

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Dec. 2.—The validity of contracts for advertisements in Sunday newspapers was upheld today by the Missouri supreme court.

The case at issue was suit of the Pultitzer Publishing company (St. Louis, Post Dispatch) against Henry J. McNichols for part payment on a contract for Sunday advertising. McNichols defense was that the publication of a newspaper on Sunday was a violation of the state labor law.

The opinion of Chief Justice Woodson of the supreme court says: "The only question presented for determination is whether the publication of the great daily papers of the country is a work of necessity."

"The great service the press is rendering humanity is performed on Sunday as well as upon Monday or upon any other day of the week and its beneficence is more potent on the former than on the latter, for the simple reason that the toiling masses have more time to read the papers on Sunday and therefore acquire greater knowledge and information from them on that day than upon any other day of the week.

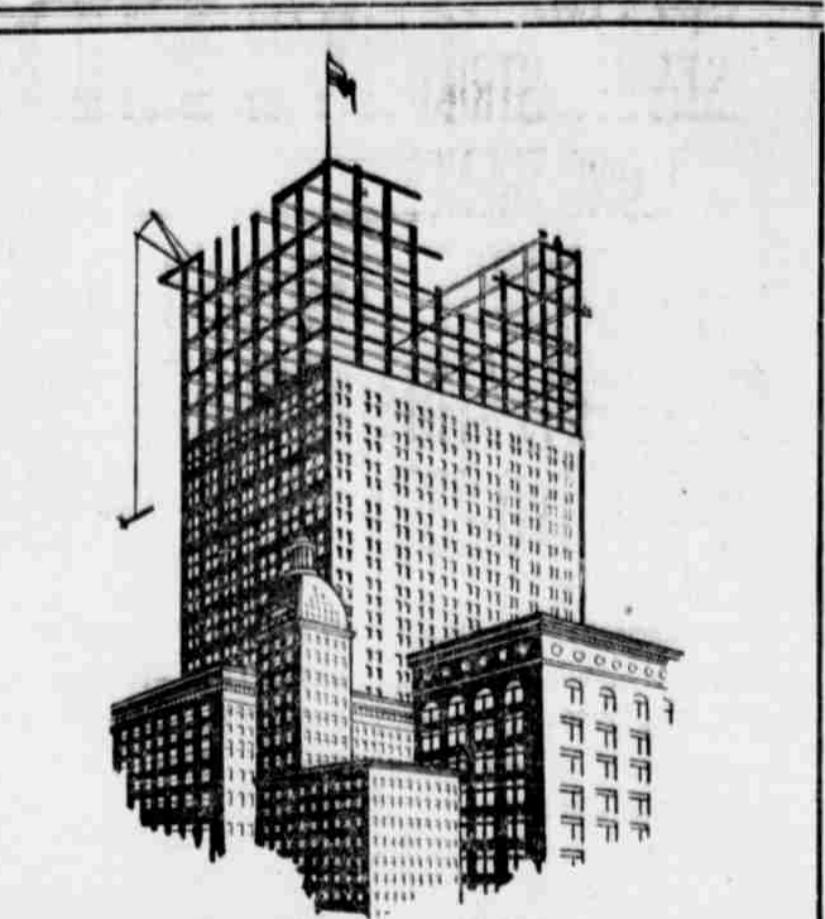

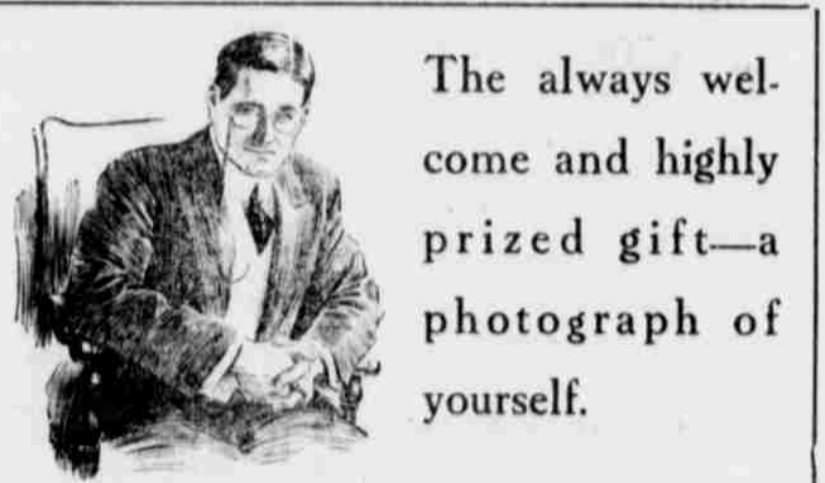

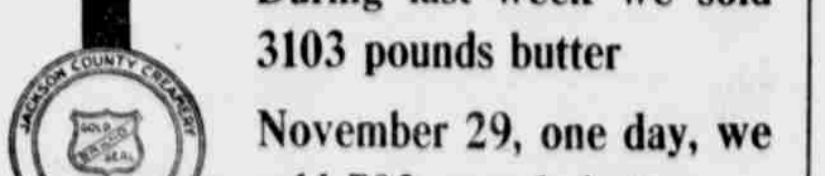
