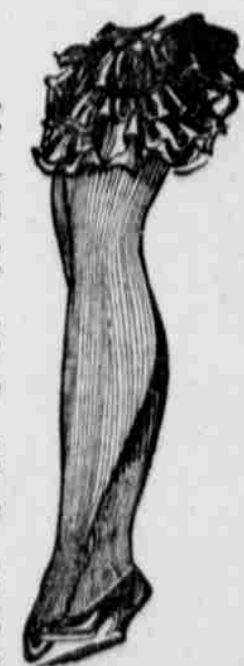

RUSSIANS CAPTURE ENTIRE STAFF OF GERMAN DIVISION

PETROGRAD, Dec. 9.—The entire staff of the 82d German army division was captured by Russian scouts and brought as prisoners into the Russian lines as the result of a daring night raid recently, according to unofficial accounts which have just been received.

Under cover of darkness a small company of scouts worked its way past the German trenches toward the German base. Emerging from a wood, the scouts found themselves close to a village. They stopped and sent forward a reconnoitering party.

The latter soon came upon a German sentry, who gave the alarm. Ten minutes later a German cavalry squadron galloped out of the village, followed by two companies of Austrian Landstrum troops. The Russians meanwhile had dismounted, hiding their horses and concealing themselves from the Germans and Austrians, who fell into the ambush and became panic-stricken when the Russians opened fire, the Austrians running for their lives and throwing down their rifles. In the confusion the German cavalry, not knowing how large a force might be opposing them, also retreated, many troopers falling under the Russian fire.

The Russians were ordered to follow on foot into the village. They came upon a large estate, and through the windows of the mansion made out the figures of German officers.

A rush for the doors of the mansion was made by ten Cossacks, the account continued, and so quick was the progress of events that the German officers did not have time to secure their overcoats and furs before they were hustled outside and hurried to the Russian lines. The whole incident took place in less than fifteen minutes.

It is stated that the captured staff included two generals, one being a division commander, seven staff officers and several Red Cross physicians. One colonel was killed in attempting to escape.

FRENCH RETREAT STRATEGICAL

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The French retirement from the Krivolak-Cerna positions must be regarded as a purely strategical move with which the recent Bulgarian activity in southern Serbia had little to do, a Reuter dispatch from Saloniki declares.

After a desperate effort by the French left to establish a connection with the Serbian forces making a last stand at Babuna Pass, which lack of time and resources made impossible, the dispatch continues, the French were compelled to readjust their lines with a view to shortening their front and taking up winter quarters more easily supplied and less exposed to the inclemency of the weather.

The French having retired eastward, their new position is now closely connected with the strong positions held by the British.

WITHYCOMBE PARDONS JOSEPHINE MURDERER

SALEM, Or., Dec. 9.—After having served ten years in the state prison for the murder of William Dunlap, an aged miner of Grants Pass, A. E. Dodson, who was once sentenced to hang for the crime, was pardoned by Governor Withycombe. Dodson was sentenced to hang August 11, 1905, but a movement to have his sentence commuted to life imprisonment was successful.

The murder was a cold-blooded affair. Dunlap had entertained Dodson and believed him to be his friend. He was shot down without warning. Following his crime, Dodson rushed from the cabin, but later returned to loot the place.

RUSSIAN ADMIRAL AT WAR COUNCIL

PARIS, Dec. 9.—Vice-Admiral Roussine, chief of the general staff of the Russian army, arrived in Paris today. He was accompanied by several Russian naval officers.

Another session of the general war council of the entente allies was held this morning. Admiral Roussine was present.
