

THE LAND GRANT DECISION

THE decision of Judge Wolverton in the Oregon land grant case, holding the railroad entitled to an equity of \$2.50 an acre and no more, confirms the interpretation of the supreme court decision made by the Mail Tribune -which was flatly contradicted by the Portland Oregonian and other organs of predatory privilege striving to protect the railroad and enrich it with something belonging to the people under court decree.

ACREAGE IN SIGHT

A SAMPLE of the accuracy of Grants Pass news is shown by the following dispatch in the Portland Maxwell cars than have ever been Oregonian of December 10:

GRANTS PASS, Or., Dec. 9.—(Special.)—It is almost a certainty that the Rogue river valley will get a sugar factory. More than 3600 acres of acceptable beet land has been signed up and the local beet committee is still at work, the slogan being "get the acreage first, the location later."

Of the 3600 acres already signed up, the Grants Pass district has more than 2700 acres. Aside from this the Rogue River, Merlin, Leland, Glendale and Wolf Creek sections, all of which are directly tributary to Grants Pass, add over 200 acres, leaving approximately 650 acres to the credit of Gold Hill, Central Point and Medford combined.
