DIED Robert A. Donaldson died at the hospital in this city yesterday after having arrived here from Stockton, California, only two days before. Attendants were surprised at his becoming severely ill suddenly, his death occurring 24

Deceased was one of the pioneers of Jackson county, having located here in 1872, after a residence of eight years in Linn county. She was well known and greatly respected by the old-time residents of this valley, many of whom survive her.

Deceased is survived by a husband, A. J. Daley, and three children, Mrs. Rosetta Potter of Ashland; G. W. Daley of Eagle Point, and J. H. Daley of Medford.

Funeral services will be held at the grave in Eagle Point cemetery Saturday at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.
