RIGHT WAY TO BRUSH THE TEETH



Many people, even those who with faithful regularity brush their teeth twice daily, do not brush them properly—and properly means in a manner that will really clean them.

is shown in the accompanying pictures. The brush is held with the bristles upright. In this way the back of the teeth and all crevices are reached and as the bristles in this position give more resistance the dirt is better scraped off.

The common fault is of holding the brush so that the bristles brush across the teeth with a sideways motion. While this more or less cleans the surfaces of the teeth touched by the brush, the bristles do not get into the tiny crevices where food particles that cause decay lurk.
