

A SIMPLE DEVICE IN BLIGHT WAR IN THIS COUNTY

(By W. W. WATSON.)

During the past summer the twig or pear blight became very serious in its devastation in orchards in many regions throughout this county.

According to official reports from many sources, compiled after exhaustive inquiry and demonstration, the blight comes to a general standstill in the bark, after destroying a certain part of it.

When these germs survive the heat of the summer and autumn, they almost invariably live through the winter. Such cases become "holdover" blight, the supply of germs being kept in the orchard for the next season's work.

County Pathologist Cate, for this county, and Horticultural Commissioner Allen, for this district, have begun a blighting blight war—and they know how to wage it.

While you wait, the bug works—and he works industriously. It is a case in which neutrality is dangerous. No ship of peace may intervene successfully in a war on orchard pests.

I trust I may be permitted, however, unofficially to tell the orchardists something about the importance of getting the affected brush from the orchard after it is pruned, and of destroying it.

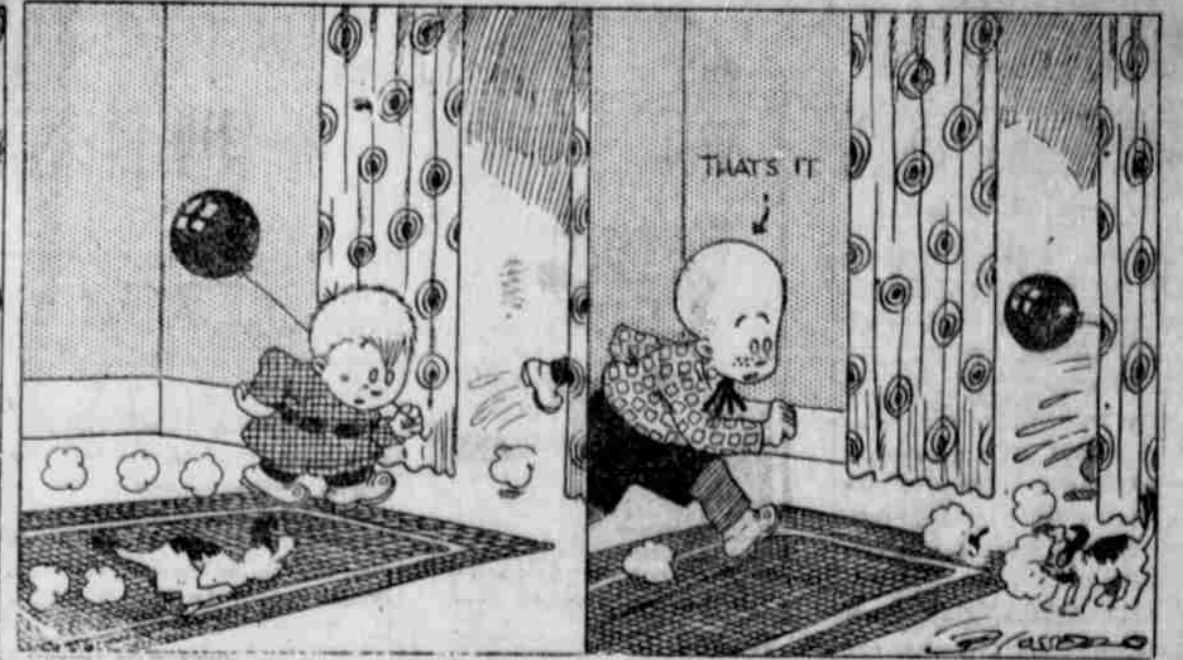
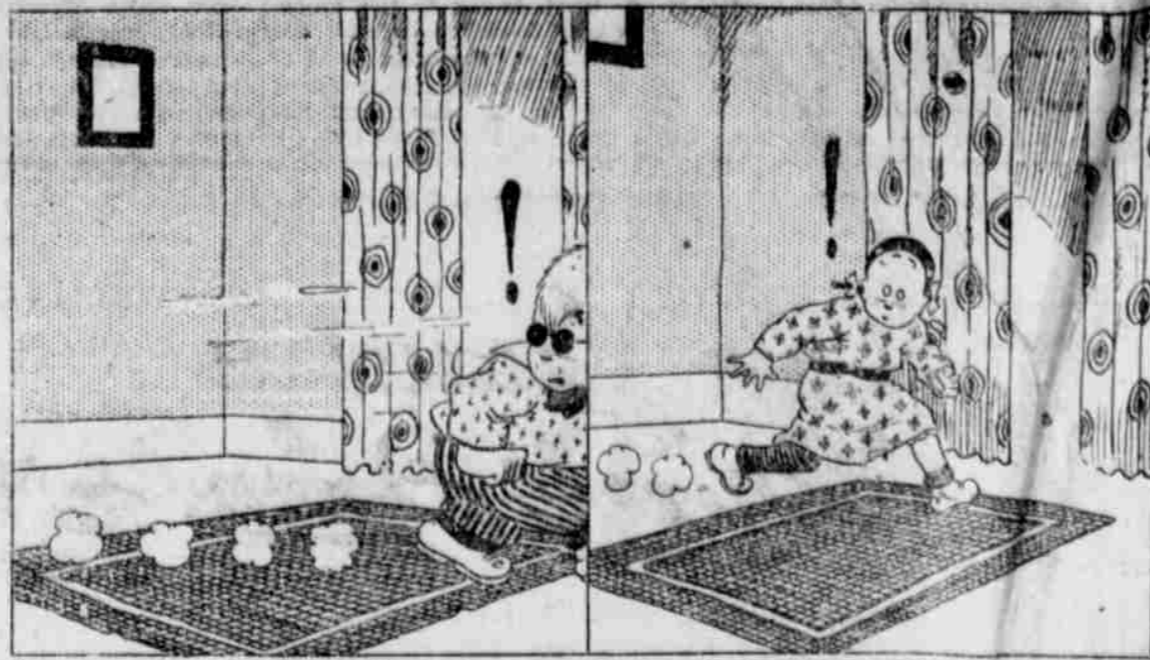
Cheap and Simple Device

There are several methods of getting the brush out of the orchard, but too frequently none of them are used. In several fruit farms of this valley—and it's so everywhere—I have observed that the custom is to pile the brush in a ravine or ditch or fence corner and leave it there as a pasture for myriads of insects and a convenient harbor for rabbits, rats, squirrels, gophers and mice.

A cheap and very effective brush burner consists of a half-circle of sheet iron, with one or both ends closed, mounted on long sled runners. Make it about ten feet long and five feet wide across the top.

This device is simple and cheap—and there's no patent on it. Any farmer can make one. And in it he

can burn other debris and sticks that frequently collect in any field or orchard.

ENTENTE MOVEMENTS IN NEAR EAST VITAL

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Two new landings by the entente allies in the Near East are reported today. The British have transferred some troops from Saloniki to Orzono, a small Greek port sixty miles east of Saloniki, with the intention of thus checking any possibility of a hostile advance from this quarter.

An Athens dispatch says that the occupation of Adalia is the object of the landing. A railway runs north of Adalia and the presence there of a strong entente force would menace the communications of any hostile force operating against Egypt or the lower Tigris region.

These movements indicate that the entente allies' positions around Saloniki are now considered serious, and indications that the campaign around Saloniki will develop into a long drawn out warfare as on other fronts.

KIRCHWEY IS NEW SING SING WARDEN

ALBANY, Dec. 31.—Dr. B. Kirchwey, former dean of Columbia law school, notified Governor Whitman tonight that he would accept the wardenship of Sing Sing prison which had been offered in succession to Thomas Mott Osborne, who is under indictment.

In the event that Osborne refused to resign, it was understood the governor would have him removed by the superintendent of prison.

STEADY PROGRESS IN IMPROVEMENTS IN ASHLAND, 1915

ASHLAND, Dec. 31.—Building and other improvements, though not numerous, aggregated quite an amount in this city during 1915. Overshadowing all other outlays combined was the expenditure on the mineral springs project, directly involving \$175,000. In addition, the city assumed other expenses incident to enlarging the park area, and it is safe to state that Ashland's big municipal improvement will total over \$200,000 when the figures are all in.

The biggest individual enterprise of the year was the installation of the Ashland Roller Mills, with a fifty-barrel capacity when the machinery is all in. The structure is 60x80 feet, two stories and basement, and is built over the creek at the intersection of Water and B streets. It represents a \$10,000 proposition and was built by Morton & North, the latter a newcomer here from the wheat regions of Kansas. The individual operators are J. J. Morton, A. C. North and Oliver Morton. The equipment includes wheat and barley rolls, crushers, cleaners and shellers. A neat office and commodious storage room for feed are located on the first floor. This industry patronizes the city for light, water, sewer and heat, and already supports four families in the way of affording employment, with indications that the force will steadily be increased.

In the list of new residences Charles Cain, roundhouse foreman, has built on the corner of Fifth and C streets. Carl Harris, fifthman, on B street between Fifth and Sixth. Lou Wyant, corner Eighth and C. In West Ashland, Paul Essler, on Laurel street. All these are substantial bungalows ranging in cost from \$1800 to \$2500.

In addition to other new construction there has been quite a lot of enlargement and remodeling done. R. J. Edwards, on Laurel street, has raised the roof of his dwelling, adding sleeping porches and other conveniences. Since the fire which occurred on its premises some time ago, Chester Stevenson, residing on Water Heights, has added extensively to the home surroundings which are a landmark in that vicinity. All over town barns, sheds and garages have been newly built in instances or remodelled and enlarged along the line of substantial betterments.

Railroad Improvements

The major improvement on railroad grounds is the big car shed, to replace the one blown down last winter. This will be larger and more strongly built than ever and is rapidly approaching completion. Two large fountains, as units of the springs project, are being installed at the pavilion near the exhibit building on depot grounds.

A new chautauque building and pioneer cabin, both to be installed in the park environment, are in the dim perspective. In fact, as to the

former, plans and specifications have already been submitted. Regarding the latter, it is up to the old settlers throughout the county to second the initiative which Ashland residents have taken in the premises. The California-Oregon Power Co. is finishing up its substation, located at the foot of Nevada street. Its construction is of the massive order of reinforced concrete. This building, with complicated and expensive equipment, will cost over \$20,000.

JACKSONVILLE LINE TO OPEN SATURDAY

Service on the Jacksonville line of the Bulls interests via the West Main street extension will be inaugurated Saturday, Jan. 1st, under the present Jacksonville schedule. This will be changed early next week. The first car will leave Jacksonville at 7:30 a. m. A test of the system will be made today. The workmen will be placed on the East side construction work at once, and it is expected to have cars running from Siskiyou Heights to Jacksonville by February 1st. There will be no ceremony in connection with the opening of the new line.
