JOE BAR MINE IS HELD AS HOMESTEAD

The mining property in the Blue Ledge district at Joe Bar, owned by Dave Harrell and his sister, Mrs. Martha Jones, has been filed upon as a homestead at the land office at Yreka, Cal. The former town of Hutton, now Copper is located upon the site, and the homestead entry will probably mean the passing of the little village that flourished when the Blue Ledge mine operated. The homestead entry was made by Mrs. Jones, upon the suspicion that plans were afoot by others to thus secure the property, making a hurried trip from her home to Yreka, Cal., to go through the legal formalities. There are several houses located on the Joe Bar property, and the road to the Blue Ledge runs through it. Under the homestead entry it is probable that owners of the houses will be held as squatters, and the road subject to closure, unless other arrangements could be made.

BOURTY WARRANT TOTALS \$421 FOR DECEMBER

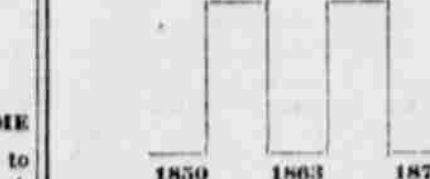
