Miss Edythe Creede, teacher of the Rancheria school, Miss Elsie Wright and C. H. Branchia returned from the teachers' convention Saturday.

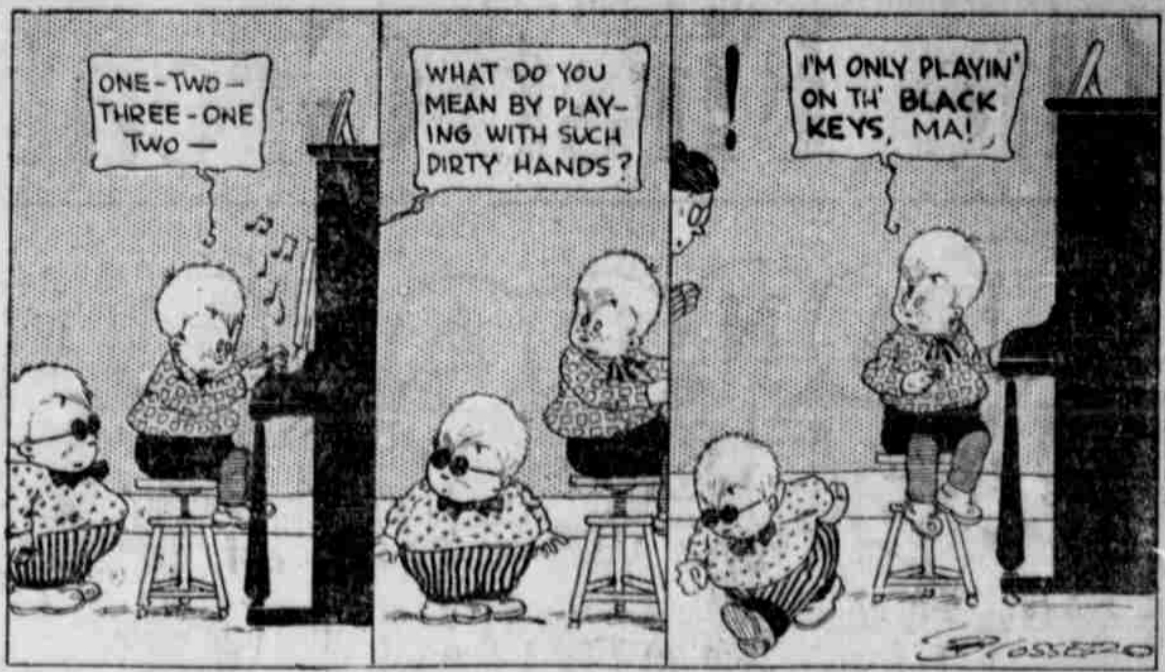
