LABOR LEADERS REFUSE OFFER OF CABINET

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Attempts were made today to induce the labor members of the government who have resigned to reconsider their position. Arthur Henderson was invited to see Premier Asquith and the two men met late in the afternoon. Afterward Mr. Henderson had an interview with Andrew Bonar-Law, secretary for the colonies.

Various suggestions were discussed at these conferences, but late last night it was understood that Mr. Henderson and his colleagues, William Bruce and George P. Roberts, who resigned Thursday, respectively as parliamentary under-secretary for home affairs, and lord commissioner of the treasury, adhered to their determination to quit the ministry and that formal letters to this effect will be sent to the premier Monday.

Much is hoped from the reopening of the Earl of Derby's recruiting scheme. The Chronicle expresses the belief that the premier's conscription bill will undergo some modifications in its committee stage which will alleviate the situation.

HEAVY FALL OF SNOW IN NORTHERN OREGON

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—Heavy snow fell Friday throughout the northern and western parts of Oregon, in the Portland vicinity the depth being four to six inches. At La Grande, Ore., a high wind developed tonight and every precaution is being taken to keep channels of traffic open. The Columbia river is frozen over in places and one boat at least was frozen in the lee. At The Dalles, the farmers welcome the heavy snow as protection for their crops against the freezing weather that has prevailed. The temperature dropped nine degrees above zero this morning. In the Hood River district of Oregon the snow was a foot deep this morning. Stern warnings were ordered out at the mouth of the Columbia river tonight.

A crowd of men and women estimated at 200 had gathered at the East Youngstown end of the bridge and jeered the workmen as they crossed. Suddenly a shot was fired and guards, taking this as a signal, fired over the heads of the crowd. The mob replied, and another volley came. A number of persons, including two women, fell and the mob broke and ran up the hillside. A block away they reformed and almost immediately set fire to the building occupied by the tube company's employment bureau. Later they fired a small warehouse and then turned their attention to private property.

A saloon stood on the corner and a rush was made for the door, a shouting crowd quickly looted the place and then a match was applied. A clothing store nearby was next entered and the stock passed out to the constantly growing crowd in the street by those inside. When the looting was finished the place was fired.

By this time the mob was in a frenzy. Liquor was passed around freely, and those who had no cups scooped it up in the hollows of their hands. Within half an hour other saloons had been looted and the fire was spreading rapidly.

For an hour or more the mob was content with the small shops and saloons on the side streets, but then it turned its attention to the more pretentious stores in Wilson avenue, the main street.

By this time it had lost all semblance of leadership, and splitting up into bands of twelve or more, went madly about the work of destruction. Saloon after saloon was looted and fired, the flames spreading to business buildings. Fanned by a strong wind, the fire spread up the hill and many residences were burned.

Cause of a Strike

Two weeks ago laborers of the Republic Iron & Steel company struck for an increase of wages from 19 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 25 cents an hour. The Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. offered them 22 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents an hour immediately after the United States Steel corporation had announced its increase of 10 per cent for laborers. This was rejected by the workers and the strike has since been in progress. Reports today are prevalent that strike-breakers had been imported and precipitated the trouble.
