

PERMITS ISSUED FOR IRRIGATION BY STATE ENGINEER

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—During the year ending December 31, 1915, the state engineer issued 581 permits for the appropriation and storage of water. These permits call for the irrigation of 87,329 acres of land, the development of 30,756 horsepower and the storage of 253,669 acre feet of water, and cover municipal supply for Tillamook, Oregon City, Gaston, Amity, Falls City, Portland, Milton, Cove, Halfway, East Side, Marshfield, Lakeside, Newport and Reedsport. The total estimated cost of all works to be constructed under these permits is \$5,349,152. In addition to the permits for irrigation, power and municipal supply, a large number have been issued for individual domestic supply, manufacturing and numerous other uses to which water is applied.

Malheur county leads during the past year for the number of permits issued, there being 109. Josephine county follows with 47, Harney county 42, Baker 41, Grant 40, Crook 34, Jackson 34, Wallowa 30, Hood River 28, Wasco 23, Umatilla 17, Tillamook 12, Wheeler 14, Lake 13, Wheeler 11, Klamath 11, Douglas 10, Union 9, Curry 8, Jefferson 7, Lane 7, Morrow 3, Clatsop 2, Lincoln 1, Sherman 1, Gilliam 1, while in the Willamette valley 26 permits have been issued.

Of the above permits, 117 were issued during the quarter ending December 31, 1915. These permits cover the irrigation of 26,849 acres, the development of 6111 horsepower, and the storage of 201,628 acre feet of water.

The following permits were issued in Jackson county during the past quarter:

Billings of Ashland, for the irrigation of 160 acres, diverting water from the west branch Ashland creek in section 21, township 39 S., range 1 east, H. Silver and J. S. Bailey of Ashland, for domestic supply, diverting water from springs in section 7, township 39 S., range 1 east, L. D. Dollard of Siskiyou, for the irrigation of 40 acres, diverting water from Carter creek, in section 21, township 40 S., range 2 east, J. W. Richardson of Medford, for the irrigation of four acres, including domestic supply, diverting water from old Spring creek, in section 16, township 33 S., range 2 east, F. E. Martin of Medford, for the irrigation of 52 acres, diverting water from Bear creek, in section 20, township 35 S., range 4 west.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

Fred G. Buchtel, deputy state seal of weights and measures has announced his candidacy on the republican ticket for public service commissioner for the Western district. Formerly the title of this office was railroad commissioner, but the last legislature transferred it to public service commissioner.

Deputy State Seal Buchtel is the son of Joe Buchtel, the pioneer photographer and fire chief of Portland, and is 28 years old. After graduating from the common schools he completed his education in the high school of Portland. His public career began as clerk of the county board of relief of Multnomah county, when Judge Lionel R. Webster an county judge, and Frank Barnes and W. L. Lightner, present county commissioner constituted the board of county commissioners for the county.

After passing a rigid civil service examination he was named seal of weights and measures for Portland in May, 1905. He has been identified with weights and measure work ever since, and is regarded as an authority on the subject. Recognizing his ability State Treasurer Kay appointed him deputy state seal when the weights and measure law passed by the 1915 legislature became operative, and since then he has been in active charge of the state department. He is the author of the comprehensive weights and measure law passed by the last legislature, which in addition to reducing the cost of the administration of his department, put the state on an equal basis with any state in the weight and measure world. Because of his wide experience with weights and measures he is regarded as excellently qualified for public service commissioner, the duties of the two offices being in many ways alike.
