WHY THIS FRENZIED HASTE?

IN an article in the Saturday Evening Post, H. G. Wells, the British author, asserts that the prophet emerging with greatest honor from the war is Bloch, a Russian, who a score of years ago predicted that a struggle between fairly equal antagonists must end in a deadlock because of the continually increasing efficiency of entrenched infantry, giving the defensive an advantage over the most brilliant strategy and over vastly superior numbers that would discourage all aggression.

Mr. Wells points out how, with the battle of the Marne, the Victorian era of fighting vanished, supplanted by Bloch's fortified trenches, ushering in twentieth century warfare. Only when Russian munitions failed in the east, compelling retreat, has there been a lapse into the old style of fighting.

The war's deadlock will be ended, predicts Mr. Wells, by general exhaustion of both sides. As he puts it:

It will dawn upon Europe that she has already dissipated the resources that have enabled her to levy the tribute paid for her investments in every quarter of the earth, and that neither the Germans nor their antagonists will be able for many years to go on with those projects for world exploitation which lay at the root of the great war.

It is evident that warfare has been revolutionized by trench fighting and that all the advantage lies with the defense. This is one of the many lessons being taught by the war.

We are hysterically told that we need the biggest navy we already have the second largest—and an army of a million to resist invasion at the war's conclusion.

There will be plenty of time to prepare for mythical enemies after the lessons of war being taught at others' expense have been learned.

MEXICAN INTERVENTION

WHEN Mexican intervention was first talked of under the Taft administration, the military board reported to the president that an initial appropriation of \$50,000,000 and an army of 350,000 men would be required as the first step for armed invasion.

Following the seizure of the principal cities would come an extended guerilla warfare, with practically the entire population in arms. The military task would degenerate into a huge police problem, similar to that now faced by Carranza.

Armed intervention in Mexico would mean the adoption of the European gospel of force and the abandonment of the American ideal that just government must rest upon the consent of the governed—the inalienable right of man; the substitution of old world empire for new world republic.

The Mexicans, handicapped by ignorance, dogmatism, cruelty and tyranny, have, nevertheless, succeeded through the revolution in manufacturing their power and should be aided in every way possible to work out their own salvation by their big sister republic to the north.

Headheads who would declare war because a gang of bandits and Americans should remember that because the nation has the power to crush a weaker one, it does not justify the abandonment of the ideals of liberty to accomplish it.

RATE EXPERTS ORGANIZE TRAFFIC LEAGUE FOR COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18.—Announcement was made here today of the organization of the Pacific Coast Traffic League, comprising the leading traffic experts of chambers of commerce, manufacturers and merchant associations and other trade organizations of the Pacific coast.

To induce congress to increase the interstate commerce commission from seven to nine members.

To bring about regular hearings of the Pacific coast by a board of three of the proposed nine members of the interstate-commerce commission.

To establish the shippers' right to appeal from negative orders of the interstate-commerce commission.

To force the railroad's transcontinental freight bureau to hold on the Pacific coast its meetings pertaining to Pacific coast rates.

To insist upon publication of the trans-continental freight bureau's booklet in advance of its meetings.

To secure lower telegraphic rates on cereal and livestock quotations.

In addition to President Seth Mann, the officers elected to the league were: W. A. Hoars, Seattle, vice-president; John S. Willis, San Francisco, secretary; and E. P. Gregg, Los Angeles; J. N. Tool and J. H. Lotrop, Portland, Or.; and Gen. J. Bradley, Sacramento, Cal., directors.

RANSOM SAVES SIX AMERICANS

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 18.—Dr. E. H. Peltier, of the National Mining & Smelting company at Magdalena, Durango, one of the refugees who arrived partly today, told of having been seized up with six other Americans, waiting to be shot by the followers of General Breuninger, who shot up the camp and took everything in sight about a week ago.

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SHIPPING BILL TERMS APPROVED BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Tentative agreement on the terms of the administration shipping bill which will be pressed in congress this session, was reached today at a conference between President Wilson and Chairman Alexander of the house marine committee.

The bill will be much better and stronger than the one which failed in the last congress, said Representative Alexander, after his conference with the president.

NICHOLAS FIGURES ALLIES CAUSE LOST DECLARES BERLIN

BERLIN, Jan. 18, by wireless.—"Berlin newspapers," says the Overseas News agency, "in expressing satisfaction over the surrender of Montenegro, point to the political abilities of King Nicholas and recall the fact that the emperor of Russia called him his 'unique friend'."

The newspapers declare it is now perfectly clear that extreme measures taken by the entente powers against Greece were in order to weaken the impression which the Montenegrin catastrophe would have.

London, Jan. 18.—The Paris correspondent of the Times learns that the Serbian government will establish itself in France, probably at Aix En Provence, a city in the department of Bouches Du Rhone, a short distance north of Marseille.
