A note that sounds the tone of forthcoming building revival in this city this year is found in the news that William Davis, with the Fruit Grocery company, Central avenue, has nearly completed a five-room bungalow at 507 South Central avenue. The structure is nearly ready for the plasterers. It was begun early this month. Besides the five spacious rooms, the bungalow contains a bath and three porches. It is erected on a lot and a half. From the premises the old Inve Miller residence was removed. It was one of the oldest houses in Medford, having been built about thirty years ago by Dave Miller, formerly a hardware merchant here, but now in the same business in Gold Hill. The new bungalow will be surrounded by probably the largest hard maple trees in the city. It was largely on account of the excellent shade afforded by these ornamental trees that Mr. Davis bought the property about three years ago.

House, President Wilson's personal representative to Europe. The news that Colonel House definitely has decided to visit Berlin is displayed as information of the first importance and the newspapers publish long preliminary letters from the United States concerning his mission.

The Hamburg Fremdenblatt declares that Colonel House's errand is to restore harmony among the American ambassadors in Europe and expresses the hope that the efforts to restore peace will be successful.

BARK IN DISTRESS OFF COLUMBIA BAR SIGNALS FOR AID

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 25.—The 302 Ononota left here shortly before noon today in response to a call for assistance from the French bark Bayard, which cleared the Columbia river yesterday with a cargo of wheat valued at \$138,420.

The call for aid from the Bayard was forwarded by wireless by the oil tank steamer Colonel E. L. Drake, which is reported to be standing by. The message stated that the bark's fore and topgallant masts were gone and her sails were in ribbons. Immediately off the mouth of the Columbia there has been no heavy weather since the Bayard's departure yesterday.

As the vessel's position is given as 45 miles south of the Columbia, it was expected that the Ononota would reach here within a few hours.

The crew of the Bayard, including officers, numbers 33 men. Captain Rebel is her master. All the crew came with the vessel from Europe except one man, Floyd S. Bateman, who shipped from Portland.

The bark crossed the Columbia river bar yesterday at 4 p. m. with a cargo of 111,743 bushels of wheat, valued at \$138,430. She is under charter to M. H. Houser of Portland and she sailed for Queenstown for orders.

FORD PEACE PARTY BACK IN STOCKHOLM

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 25.—Preparatory to the arrival here today of the Ford peace expedition, thirty-four rooms at the Grand Hotel have been reserved. The peace conference is expected to begin work within a fortnight. According to Mayor Carl Lindhagen, five nations will be represented in the conference, Holland, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and America. Switzerland, Spain and Portugal have not replied to invitations to send delegates. Mayor Lindhagen gave no intimation of the manner in which the conference will proceed, or how it will try to bring about peace. The newspapers here give very little space to the movements of the peace advocates.

POINCARRE RETURNS FROM TRIP TO WAR FRONT

PARIS, Jan. 25.—President Poincarre, the president of the senate, Antonin Dubost, and the president of the chamber of deputies, Paul Deschanel, returned to Paris today from a trip to the eastern end of the front. They visited the Vosges region Sunday and Monday and spent some time in Alsation villages. They returned by way of Belfort.

COLONEL HOUSE VISITS AT GENEVA

GENEVA, Switzerland, Jan. 24, Via Paris.—Colonel E. M. House, President Wilson's personal representative, arrived here this morning and left at 5 o'clock in the afternoon for Berlin. He was accompanied by two secretaries of the American embassy in Berlin, who came here to meet him.

Colonel House said to the Associated Press correspondent that many misstatements had been published in the European press concerning the motives of his visit and that he desired again to affirm that it was in no wise connected with any peace movement or any peace proposals, but that his purpose continued to be that which had been announced before he left the United States.
