MEDFORD'S CHANCE FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Medford high school basketball team stands the best chance to win the championship of Oregon when it plays Roseburg on February 3 and 4, in Medford, that any local team has ever had.

Salem high has won from all the Willamette teams, beating Eugene 26 to 22. This gave it the valley championship. They then invaded Portland and defeated Lincoln, whose team now appears to be slated for the city championship.

Lincoln has defeated the crack eastern Oregon teams and holds a high place in the Washington state race.

Salem brought Roseburg to their floor last Tuesday night and won 21 to 19.

Medford defeated Eugene, 8 to 2 and 12 to 7 in the two games here and at all times were their masters. Salem barely won from Eugene. The Roseburg team is composed of the same men who defeated Medford last year by 3 or 4 baskets, and have not lost but one game this season. The local team is stronger this year by 100 percent, and this is being doped out by local fans that this gives the locals the edge.

MRS. MOHR SAYS NEGROES INNOCENT AND DOCTOR CRUEL

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 27.—Recital of her marital experiences was continued today by Mrs. Elizabeth Mohr as a witness in her own defense against the charge that she hired two men to murder her husband, Dr. C. Franklin Mohr.

Yesterday she told of the physicians attention to other women and the abuse she received when she accused him of faithlessness.

Today she explained her relations with the negroes, her alleged accomplices, whom she said were innocent.

Earlier Mrs. Mohr had told of repeated beatings received from her husband when she objected to his attentions to other women.

Questioned further by her counsel, Arthur Cushing, she told of a reconciliation in 1913, followed soon by the final break.

Mrs. Mohr said that at the time she filed her suit for separate maintenance the doctor was earning \$52,000 a year, but she asked for an allowance of only \$100 a month.

She attached his property and refused his request to have the attachment released. Later, the witness said, she signed over her property to the doctor as a result of his threats.

"I thought I had a right to get it back again because he was so cruel to me," she said.

COLD WAVE STILL GRASPS NORTHWEST

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 27.—More snow is predicted for Eastern Washington tonight. This will add to the huge mass piled on the mountain sides. Warm weather cannot be long delayed, and a sudden change of temperature must result in slides and floods in the steep country.

The body of Ralph Batterman, aged eight, killed in the Great Northern wreck last Saturday, when his father and baby sister also perished, was shipped to Wenatchee, Wash., this morning. The body of Bert Kirkman, another victim, was shipped last night to Sheridan, Wyo., where his wife resides. The body of J. H. Wilson, the last of the passengers recovered, will be sent to Vancouver, B. C., from Everett.

Precipitation in Seattle since January 1 is half an inch below average, and Western Washington rivers are low, on account of the cold weather.

Alaska reports these below zero temperatures: Tananes 42, Eagle 26, Valdez 16, Nome 2. These figures show a general moderation as compared with a week ago.
