DECLARES OBREGON MAN OF THE HOUR IN OLD MEXICO

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Four American mining engineers who arrived here today from Vera Cruz on the steamer Esperanza reported that the train on which they traveled from Mexico City to Vera Cruz had been under constant fire from bandits throughout the entire journey.

The engineers said they left Mexico City two weeks ago and traveled in an armored car which carried four three-inch guns. According to their story, the whole territory between the Mexican capital and the southeast is infested with bandits.

The engineers asserted that Carranza's power was waning and that General Obregon was the man of the hour in Mexico City.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 8.—A declaration that he would force intervention by the United States within six weeks, attributed to Francisco Villa by a Mexican from Madera, was brought to the attention of American officials here and Mexican authorities at Juarez today.

10,000 SURGEONS IS NEED OF U. S. ARMY

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—The United States in a few years will have an army of one million men ready to take the field and to meet the requirements of this vast body of men at least 10,000 surgeons will be required, asserted Dr. W. C. Gorgas, surgeon-general of the United States army, before the annual congress on medical education here today.

Dr. Gorgas was urging the adoption of a proposal offered earlier in the day for a national conference of medical examiners, composed of representatives of state medical examining boards, which would prepare examination questions for state boards throughout the country.

WILLIAMS AND HERMAN FIGHT TO HOT DRAW

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 8.—Kid Williams of Baltimore, world's bantamweight champion, and Pete Herman of New Orleans fought twenty rounds to a draw last night. The decision was given by Referee William Hecap of Philadelphia.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 8.—The lull which extends over the whole Russian front with the exception of a recrudescence of unimportant artillery, aeroplane and mining warfare on the Deinsk-Riga line, and information of the recent transfer of large bodies of German troops to the westward are taken by the Russian authorities as an indication that the Germans are content for the present with holding their own in Bukovina and the northern sector and are again preparing to apply the greater part of their strength on the western front.
