

PIGEONS OFFER PROFITABLE FIELD FOR VALLEY FOLK

C. P. Carpenter, one of the successful pigeon exhibitors at the poultry show last week, has the only extensive commercial pigeon plant in the valley. It is located at Perrydale, on the electric line to Jacksonville. He now has about 500 pigeons on the ranch.

Mr. Carpenter began about four years ago with five pairs of pigeons of the utility breed called Belgian Carneaux. He sold readily to the local market from the start among those who are fond of squabs. Their number has increased until the local market some months consumes his entire output.

One pair of Belgian Carneaux will raise ten pairs a year. They are attentive, dutiful feeders of their young and the latter quickly become able to rustle for themselves. Mr. Carpenter is entirely satisfied with the profits of the business and is constantly enlarging his plant.

V. A. Myers, of Ashland, probably has the next largest plant. He has both utility and fancy breeds. His Maltese birds are those from which he obtains the chief profit, the feathers being worth a little more than 50 cents a pound. His squabs sell readily at 70 cents a pair.

Mrs. L. A. Salade made an attractive exhibit of Runts. This name is misleading. The runt pigeon is very large, multiplies rapidly, matures to marketable squab size very quickly and sells very readily.
