

ALL MEDFORD HEARS REVIVALIST THRICE ON SUNDAY

Yesterday was a red-letter day for the churches of the city. The Nat was filled for the 11 o'clock service. Mr. Mathis spoke on "The Second Mile" in part as follows:

"If any compel thee to go a mile with him, go with him twain." was the text. "The first mile is duty, the second is privilege. Jesus is talking about the spirit of striking back—the spirit of revenge, the spirit of striking back is that of the devil. Going the second mile means loving your enemies."

"You do not have to possess the first symptom of manhood to curse back a man who curses you. Any old hag from the red light district can do that."

"Going the second mile means doing good to them who hate you. You can never hate any man into the kingdom; you may love him in."

"Would you go the second mile? Then pray for them who wrong you."

"You can become a winner of men on the second mile where you would fail on the first."

"Going the second mile your prayers will be answered which would not going the first."

Women's Meeting.

The 3 o'clock sessions for women only was attended by about 800 women. Mr. Mathis' theme was "The Ideal Woman for Tomorrow." It was a serious call to every woman to rise to the demands of the new era and make the most of herself for the larger demands already made upon her.

The evening hour was the crowning service of the day. The great congregation filled every inch of available space in the great hall long before the hour announced. The music was unusually enthusiastic. A male quartet—Messrs. Vessel, Edmeades, Bennett and Canaday, sang twice. Mr. Vessey sang "A Perfect Day" in his most persuasive manner. Mr. Mathis preached on "The Open Door" as follows:

"Behold, I stand at the door and knock. The first door I note is love. This is the front door. I marvel that every normal man does not open the door to love. Fear is the back door—the lowest motive to induce any man to become a Christian. You know as well as I we are barring the door against the Son of God. Here are some of the bars we put up: Unbelief is such a bar. Unbelief is doing no good anywhere in the world."

Bars That Are Put Up.

"Doubt is such a bar. I have all possible patience with an honest doubter. God can never leave an honest doubter in the dark."

"Another bar is selfishness. The greatest life to live in this old world is that lived out for others. Selfishness bars Jesus Christ out of many a life. No man really lives until he becomes a Christian. And to be a Christian is to let God work in you for two worlds. Ignorance bars God from many a life. We are ignorant of what God can do for a human soul. It is love and mercy makes God stand and knock at your heart's door."

"If we were to treat a friend as we treat Jesus Christ, not one of us would have a friend. God is a God of love—but we can be lost in spite of God. It is possible to find the door shut before us eternally—and it's not the Son of God who shuts the door. If a man accepts Jesus Christ he is saved, but if he rejects Jesus Christ he is lost."

There will be no service at the Nat tonight.

Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock the great automobile parade will take place. It is expected that seventy-five to one hundred cars will be in line.

take the case into court again; second, that the secretary of agriculture be consulted as to whether the lands should be included in existing forest reserves; third, that something like \$3,000,000 be appropriated to settle with the railroad; and fourth, suggests that congress act promptly since the supreme court has given six months in which congress may act, at the end of which time the company may go into the courts again.

Overpass Railroad.

Commenting on the joint resolution introduced by Representative Baker of California, the attorney general says: "To carry out this resolution there would have to be an appropriation of about \$5,750,000 to pay the railroad company, some \$2,400,000 more than it is entitled to, in my judgment, and in addition about

\$1,300,000 if the accrued taxes are to be discharged."

The attorney general sent a copy of his letter to the secretaries of interior and agriculture. Neither of these departments, however, has responded to the suggestion that they recommend to congress some action in the matter. The proposition as it now stands is that the United States government may resume the title to lands worth at least sixty million dollars by the payment of three millions, and administer them in the public interest. Instead of doing this, however, there is every indication that congress will, as usual, proceed to give away the people's property.

PROBE REMOVAL OF GERMANS FROM SHIPS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—American consular representatives in China, particularly at Shanghai, were instructed today to gather full information of the removal of sixty-eight Germans from the American steamer China on the high seas last week.

It was said at the state department that when full information was at hand a note probably would be addressed to Great Britain along the lines of the communication sent to France when the cruiser Descartes

removed Germans and Austrians from American ships near Porto Rico recently.

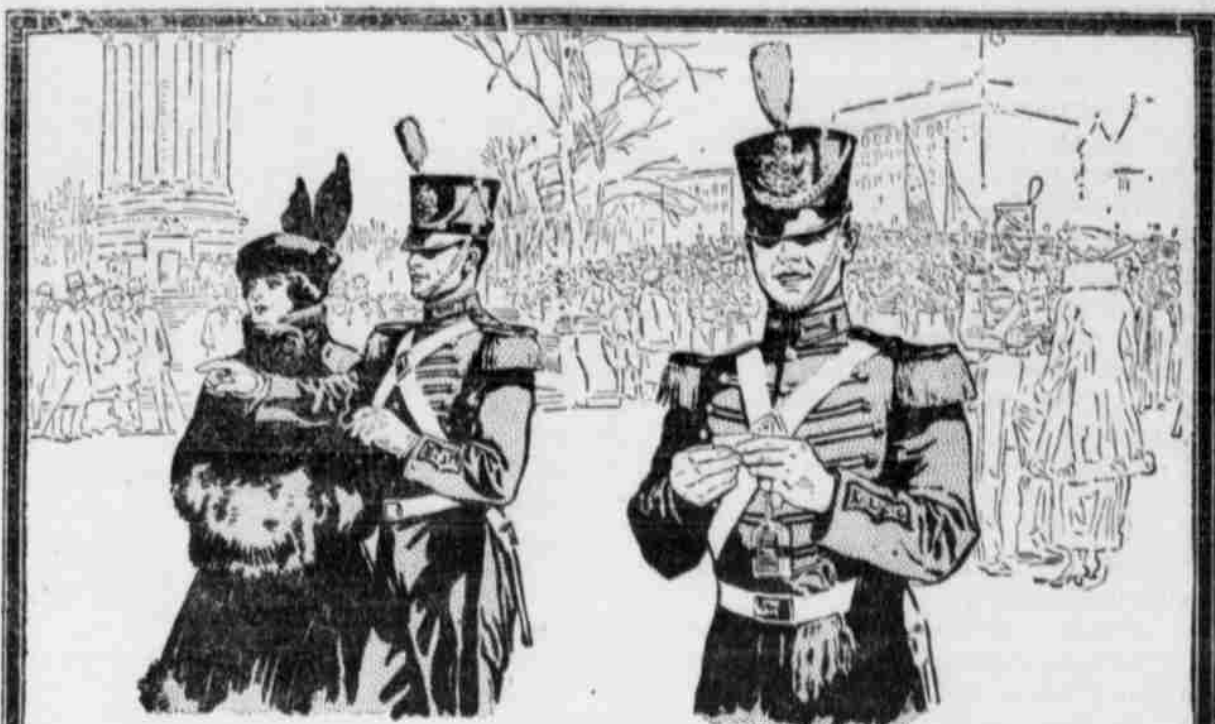
