VICTORY FOR ASTORIA

All Oregon rejoices with Astoria over the success of its long battle to secure terminal rates that will place the mouth of Columbia river on an equality with Puget Sound ports and Portland. That is, all Oregon rejoices except a small portion of Portland, which has long considered herself all of Oregon and built up the metropolis through special privilege at the expense of the state.

Astoria is to be congratulated in at last securing a square deal in freight rates and the privilege of reaping the rewards her natural advantages entitle the city to. For many years Astoria has been dwarfed by the selfish and hoggish policy of Portland, which has sought to monopolize not only the shipping business of the Columbia, but the jobbing business of the entire state.

The Portland Oregonian, champion and defender of the little Oregon-Portland hog policy, emits a fearful calamity howl over the decision which deprives Portland of her monopoly of preferential railroad rates. It says that "Portland stands to lose its entire birthright."

If the birthright of Portland is unjust to the sister cities of Oregon, she ought to lose it. If Portland, with the advantages of her wealth and population, cannot prosper through enterprise and energy, but has to depend upon the unfair methods of sandbag and throttle, she ought to experience the pentecost of calamity.

The trouble with Portland is that her growth has been forced upon her by her location without her own effort. Her enterprise and energy has been spent in devising ways and means to smother other Oregon cities and grow at their expense. Portland capital has stayed in Portland and not developed the state.

Another portion of Portland's "birthright" of injustice that the metropolis should lose is the preferential rates she enjoys as a jobbing monopoly. Portland is the only city in the United States that enjoys the exclusive privilege of a jobbing center for the entire state.

Portland will, through her geographical location, always be a distributing center, but her policy of hogging all the distribution has stifled the growth of natural distributing points, and unless these smaller cities are given a chance to grow and develop their surrounding territory there can be no greater growth for Portland.

PARENT-TEACHERS SEEK REDUCTION OF CHILD MORTALITY

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 23.—Conservation of infant life, and the healthy development of children too young to attend school were problems which received attention at the opening session of the National Congress of Mother and Parent Teachers' association held in connection with the meetings of the National Education association.

Prominent educators urged a campaign to reduce the total deaths of babies in the United States by at least 100,000 a year. Three hundred thousand infants is the annual death toll, it was said.

Mrs. Frederic Schöff of Philadelphia declared infant mortality could be reduced 60 per cent and that in the six years before children go to school 160,000 die.
