

PLAN CAMPAIGN OF PREPAREDNESS FOR SUGAR BEETS

George Austin, head agrulturist of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company and the Oregon-Utah Sugar company, met with field superintendents of the local company this forenoon at the Medford hotel. At the meeting a plan was outlined that will be followed out commencing at once.

It was decided that Messrs. F. S. Bramwell and Edwin Austin will be in charge of the agricultural work between Gold Hill and Glendale and Messrs. Samuel Storey and J. B. Pettigill will have charge of the same work from Gold Hill south.

These men will give their entire time and attention to the beet growers in their respective districts, instructing them in the selection and proper preparation of the land for the planting of beets.

Messrs. Bramwell and Austin can be reached by mail or phone at Grants Pass and Mr. Storey and Mr. Pettigill at Medford.

The beet growers are urged by the company to get in touch with these gentlemen at the earliest moment, as seed and seeders will be here within a week and seeding will commence on the early land as soon as the land is ready.

Sufficient seed has been secured to plant 7000 acres so that farmers who have not yet signed contracts, but who are considering doing so should notify the company at once. Arrangements have been made with a reliable Japanese contractor to furnish all hand labor necessary.

Any beet raisers who are depending on Japanese labor should notify the field superintendents or the company office at once.

The company will need from thirty to forty good, practical farmers to do the planting. Applications for this work should be left at the office at once.

Messrs. Austin and Bramwell will address a meeting at Central Point tonight at 7:30, to which all citizens are invited.

MATHIS PREACHES UPON UNANSWERED PROBLEMS OF LIFE

The music at the Natatorium meeting last evening was a special feature. The chorus loft was crowded and the big choir certainly have never done finer work. "Solomon was great because he had a great father—it is ever a great thing for any man to have a great father. He was great because of the loyalty he inspired from his subjects. He was great in that he asked first of all the great gifts offered him—that he might have superior wisdom to direct the affairs of his kingdom. 'Jesus Christ matches the wise king in every one of those particulars and many more.'"

"It is the unanswered questions of life that bring men to Jesus Christ. Nicodemus, the thoughtful and learned was asked regarding the problem of the new birth—and Jesus told him plainly, 'Ye must be born again.' Mysterious? Yes—so is the first birth—the physical birth. No man enters any world until he is born into that world.

"If God can fit a man for the physical world by the physical birth—is it anything strange that He can prepare a man for the spiritual world by a spiritual birth.

"Zerobah was another man who came with an unanswered question—'What shall I do?' and Jesus told him what he should do—in other language but with the same import—'Ye must be born again.'"

"The rich young ruler came—he knew full well what he ought to do and Jesus told him just what he expected him to tell him—this man needed to surrender himself—he was wrapped up in his morality—his legalism—and the one thing he had not done was to detach himself from his wealth—so the Master said—'sell and give.' This he was not willing to do.

"Thus it is ever the unanswered question brings men to the source of spiritual knowledge. And the answer is the same for all men—in order to enter the kingdom of heaven and have eternal life—a man must be born spiritually."

U. S. GIRLS, BEWARE OF PRINCE OF WALES

Countess Says He Is Not Up to American Standard

I can see how the Prince of Wales could marry an American, for American women are charming, beautiful, witty; but, frankly, I cannot see why an American girl should marry the Prince of Wales!

Name the Anglo-American marriages which have proved worth while—for the bride. How many American perennas are living with their husbands. How many silently thank their stars—and their shrewd marriage settlements—that they are NOT?

The plan to unite an all-important seton of degenerating physique with sounder stock is not new. King Milan of Serbia—himself a stupid, drunken figurehead of royalty—realized that his dwarfed, ill developed son and heir, Alexander, bore all the principle stigmata of degeneration.

The king therefore decided that the crown prince should marry an American! Her clean vitality would strengthen the rotten constitution hereditary in all royal families!

(The same intensely among the right bank of the Meuse as far as Ornes, south of Orles. Owing to the violence of the bombardment of our advanced positions at Brabant-sur-Meuse our troops have evacuated the village under cover of night, protected by the flanking fire of our positions on the left bank of the Meuse.

"An attack directed on Samogneux has been repulsed."

"Admit Retreat in Places. A strong attack which was participated in by at least one brigade was launched by the enemy in the forest of Catches. This attack succeeded in taking one part of the forest. We still hold the southern end. All the offensives directed against Beaumont, in front of which, dislodge us. East of the front attacked we hold our own in front of Ornes, where our forces hold a ravine south of Herbe forest.

"The retreat of our troops, in certain sections which were ordered to avoid useless losses was executed in perfect order and without permitting the enemy, who advanced slowly and at the price of considerable sacrifice, to break our front at any point. The bombardment continues in the region between Orles and Fomizey.

"In Lorraine the enemy has succeeded in gaining a footing in one of our advanced posts in the forest of Choznet. We have driven back some advance parties east of Reillon."
