Everyone in the punctuation class, which finished Friday, made over 99 per cent in the final test. This final was not so easy as it looked, for it consisted in punctuating and capitalizing a very difficult business letter of 400 words in length, for the first part, and for the second part of the test, to punctuate and capitalize a selection from one of Emerson's essays.

Mrs. Bruce and Miss Smock, who recently began the study of typewriting, are making splendid progress.

The regular monthly contests were held Friday and some of our boys surprised themselves. The spelling contest consists of 200 words, selected from a point of practicality and difficulty, and the best record was made by Medran Altimus, who missed but one word. If you think this is easy, try it yourself. The others missed but very few words, and were entitled to "honors."

The calculation contest consists of working twenty or more good, stiff problems in ten minutes for first honors, eighteen or nineteen for second honors and fifteen to seventeen for third honors. Medran Altimus worked nineteen correctly and secured second honors. A number of the others worked enough to secure awards if they had not already received them.

In typing, Clell McCreadie and Walter Dunten each secured second honor ribbons. This means they wrote more than forty words per minute for ten minutes, counting off five for each error. Joan Anderson was presented with a second honor ribbon at 48 net. Clell and Walter each wrote 45. The others, while they bettered their records, did not quite bring them up to secure the next highest award. Several are now working for the gold medal.

Joan Anderson and Louise Williamson are both doing very good work in the actual business office and are making a special study of all legal forms.
