LORIMER TRIAL NOW UNDERWAY

CHICAGO, March 14.—The trial of William Lorimer, once occupant of a seat in the senate of the United States and now charged with conspiracy and embezzlement in connection with the failure of the La Salle Street Trust & Savings bank, got under way today when the jury was sworn in and heard the opening statement of the prosecution, made by William H. Holly, assistant state's attorney.

Mr. Holly told the jury that it was not necessary for the state to show an actual meeting or agreement to sustain the conspiracy charge.

The law, he said, implied there was a conspiracy even if it is shown that two or more persons working along the same lines commit an unlawful act.

"In this case," said Mr. Holly, "C. B. Munday, vice-president of the bank, was in a position to know what Mr. Lorimer was doing, and Mr. Lorimer was in a position to know what Mr. Munday was doing, and each knew the other was drawing money from the bank for his own use."
