Toward sundown, while the first aeroplane ever seen in Columbus was skimming the sky to the south, men came back with the report that the expedition had camped for the night without any excitement. It is said in Columbus that conditions ahead were well known to headquarters, as the American cowboy scouts have been active. The censor has asked all correspondents filing by mail not to disclose military movements, or details as to numbers of troops, saying that to make public matters of such military importance might mean a loss of American lives. This rule applied only to mail matter, as not even the general facts of the crossing have been allowed to go over the telegraph wires, which is in direct military control.

JAMES T. TREADWELL FAMOUS MINER, DEAD

James T. Treadwell, famous mining man of the west, brother and co-worker of the discoverer of the great Treadwell mine in Alaska, died suddenly while en route home on the ferry from San Francisco to Oakland on the evening of March 6. James Treadwell was one of the foremost figures in California and Alaska mining operations. He and his brother soon became prominent figures in mining operations, as well, and succeeded in amassing great fortunes.
