OIL BURNER FOR ORCHARD HEATING CUTS OUT SMOKE

"I cut out the use of oil as a smudge in my groves at Alhambra, California, three years ago," said P. C. Helf, of that city, today. "Imperfect combustion caused the emanation of a ribbons smoke. That had to be overcome. Having no equipment at that time that yielded a perfect combustion, where oil was used, I substituted wood and have used it since. The results obtained have been just as satisfactory, without any of the damaging effects of the soot."

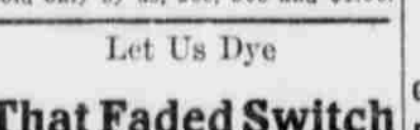
Manager J. Vilas Beckwith, of the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association, is exhibiting an oil burner said to be in successful use in the orange and lemon groves of Pomona, Cal. It is a burner that consumes all of the oil elements, only the heat remaining to combat the frost. It supplies perfect combustion, it is claimed. It costs about thirty-six cents a burner, whereas the old-style burner in use here costs only eleven cents. It is claimed that it will last many years. The excessive cost per tree, therefore, is for the first year only. The result is wholly favorable to the new burner after that. The likelihood is that the advantage dur-

ing the first year is greater than twenty-five cents a tree, which is the difference in the cost of the two burners.

At all events, everywhere orchardists are endeavoring to overcome the necessity for using the old-type burner, which gives off the dirty clouds of smoke, much to the injury of everything that it touches.

It is said that Manager Muller, of the "101" orchards; C. M. Thomas, J. S. Villas, Manager Briscoe, Ed. E. Phipps, C. A. Myers and Manager Gould have concluded to cut out the oil in their orchards, substituting wood.
