

SENATE DEBATES MUNITION PLANT FOR GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Debate on the bill for government manufacture of armor plate was continued in the senate under an agreement whereby voting on amendments was to begin at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Passage of the measure by a large majority substantially as reported was confidently predicted by democratic leaders.

Senator Oliver, republican of Pennsylvania, in whose state all three of the armor plate plants are located, declared he never had known a bill seriously proposed with so little reason and justification. "The result of a careful investigation just concluded is astounding," he said. "I honestly believe there is no foundation in fact in the belief that the government has not bought armor plate at fair and reasonable prices and I defy anyone to prove to the contrary."

Senator Swanson, democrat, declared that threats that the armor-plate makers would put up the price if the bill passed, were a reason for its passage.

If the threats were carried out, Senator Swanson declared, during the three years necessary to put the government plant into operation, the armor for the pending naval program would cost the government \$14,000,000 in excess of the price paid at present.

PUGILISTS READY FOR THE BATTLE

NEW YORK, March 21.—At the training camps of Jess Willard and Frank Moran, everyone, including the state athletic commission's physician, Dr. Joseph M. Creamer, who has seen the men in action during the last three days, seems satisfied today that both are in prime shape for next Saturday's ten-round battle.

Willard will not take any more hard morning road runs. His program today called for a two-mile walk at a stiff pace. Later he will box six or eight rounds with Hemple, Rodel and Monahan. The latter raised a lump on the right side of Willard's head with a left-hand smash yesterday, but it responded to treatment and was reduced to very small proportions today.

Moran, after his lay-off yesterday, was up early today and made preparations for his usual four-mile run across country. He intends doing a full turn in the "gym" later and will take on all of his sparring partners.
