ORDINANCE NO. 843 An ordinance amending Sections 1 and 23 of Ordinance No. 669, the same being "An ordinance regulating the use and sale of water in the city of Medford, Oregon, and prescribing rates for the use thereof, and repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith," as amended by Ordinances Nos. 824 and 814, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith. The City of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1 of Ordinance No. 669 shall be amended so as to read as follows: Section 1. The following rates are hereby fixed and specified as the minimum monthly rates to be charged to consumers of water in the City of Medford, Oregon, for the use thereof, from and after the first day of June, 1916. Public garages, including water to wash vehicles, \$5.00 to \$15.00. Office buildings and blocks: Each room above ground floor, \$1.00. Water closet (toilet, urinal and bowl) 1.50. Each additional toilet .50. Each additional urinal .50. Building purposes: For each 1000 brick laid, including water for mortar, .15. For wetting each barrel of lime for other purposes than laying brick .05. For laying cement sidewalk, per sq. ft. .005. For laying concrete paving base, per sq. yd. .01. For laying curb, per 100 lbs. ft. .25. Concrete work, per cu. ft. .002. Churches: Base rate 1.00. Barber shops: One barber's chair 1.00. Each additional chair .25. Each toilet .50. Bath tubs, each .75. Each urinal .50. Restaurants, boarding houses, eateries and lunch counters and similar establishments: Base rate \$2.00 to \$10.00. Each toilet .50. Each urinal .50. Public schools: Base rate 10.00. Dwellings: Each lot 50x150 feet or less with six-room house or less with or without bath, toilet and sink 1.50. Above 6 rooms to 9 rooms 1.75. Nine rooms to 12 rooms 2.00. Above 12 rooms 2.50. Each additional front foot .01. Apartment houses or Flats:

With two apartments and lawn 2.50. Apartment houses having four apartments or flats 3.00. Apartment houses having six apartments or more per apartment or flat of not over three rooms, each .60. Above with apartments of more than three rooms .75. Photo galleries: Base rate 2.50. Hotels, boarding houses and lodging houses: Each bedroom for guest .10. First bath tub for general use .75. Each additional bath tub for general use .50. Water closet for general use .50. Each additional water closet for general use .50. Urinals .50. Baths and toilets in private suites, each .25. Colleges, academies, boarding schools and all similar institutions where scholars board and lodge: Base rate \$1.50 to 10.00. Fixtures same as hotels. Medical and business colleges, private schools and kindergartens where scholars neither board nor lodge: According to number of scholars \$1.00 to 10.00. Moving picture shows, theaters, billiard rooms and lodges: Base rate \$1.00 to 5.00. All fixtures same as hotels. Above rate applies where water is used at all, for any purpose, whether connections are in building or not. Saloons: Base rate 3.50. All fixtures same as hotels. Hospitals and asylums: Same rate as hotels. Billiard rooms, bowling alleys, bicycle racks, shooting galleries and all like places: Base rate \$1.00 to 5.00. All fixtures same rate as hotels. Livery and feed stables: Base rate \$5.00 to 15.00. Fixtures same as stores. Railroads: Per thousand gallons .08. Soda fountains: Base rate \$1.00 to 2.00. Where candy kitchens are attached, extra 1.00. Traveling shows: 2-ring show or less, per day 5.00. 3-ring show or less, per day 7.50. 4-ring show or less, per day 10.00. In every case an additional fee of \$2.00 per day for city attendant will be charged. Stock rates: Horses and cows up to the number of four on any one premises shall be free of charge. Each additional horse or cow .10. Libraries: Same rate as public halls. 2.00. Commercial greenhouses: With dwelling of 6 room included \$2.50 to 15.00. Federal, state, county and city buildings: Same rate as office buildings and blocks. Bakeries: Base rate \$1.50 to 10.00. Blacksmith shops: Base rate 1.00. All fixtures same as stores. Manufacturers of all kinds and grave washers: Base rate \$1.00 to 15.00. Offices: And all like places on ground floor of buildings .75. All fixtures same rate as stores. Each occupant exceeding six, additional .10. Stores: Grocery, dry goods, shoe and similar stores not otherwise provided for elsewhere. Base rate with ordinary use of water by six occupants or less 1.00. Water closet .50. Each additional water closet .25. Urinal .50. For settling ditches and fills: Per cubic yard settled .01. Steam boilers for power purposes: Up to 30 h. p., per h. p. .25. Above 30 h. p., per h. p. .25. Heating plants in all buildings except dwellings: Steam or hot water \$1.00 to 2.00. Plunge baths: Meter rate of 4c per 1000 gallons. Continuous flow fixtures not permitted unless metered: Slop or will hoppers 2.50. Laundries: Base rate \$5.00 to 15.00. Shower baths: Same as bath tubs. Section 23 of Ordinance No. 669 shall be amended so as to read as follows: Section 23. In all cases within the City of Medford of lots in excess of 50 feet frontage, provided the same has not a greater depth than 150 feet, and the same is used and supplied with water at the base rate as provided in Section 1 of Ordinance No. 669, an extra charge of six cents (6c) shall be made for each additional front foot for the irrigating season in each and every year, and shall be paid to the city recorder between June 1 and June 15 of each and every year. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, on the 21st day of March, 1916, by the following vote: Mann, aye; Emmens, aye; Amy, aye; Keene, aye; Hargrave, aye; Davis, aye.
