

ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Spring development work is well-nigh completed. The raising in the Dodge soda well has been removed under supervision of Engineer Phillips of Portland, an expert on the job. This well will now be sunk to its proper depth and equipped accordingly, regardless of any previous contracts, and it is only a matter of a few days when the soda flow will be bubbling in the parks alongside the lithia and sulphur. The fine new fountain has been installed in Lathia park. Selt machines for dispensing drinking cups have been installed at the springs pavilion. Other details as to the completion of development work progress favorably in readiness for the forthcoming celebration in July. Publicity department matters are receiving due attention at an expense of about \$50 per month, whereas the fixed charges for the past half year until recently have aggregated nearly \$300 per month.
