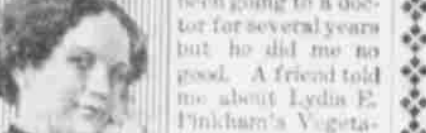

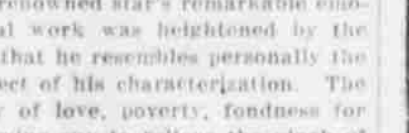

Lime Starvation Causes Tuberculosis

The Journal Record (New York) of December 15, 1909, contains an article on "The Treatment of Tuberculosis." The article is based on the observation that the dietetic cause of the disease is "lime starvation," by Dr. John P. Russell, who says "the condition which is recognized as preceding the active development of tuberculosis in the adult may be considered as due to lime starvation." 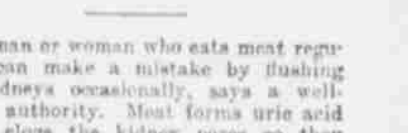

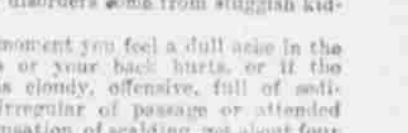
