Ten carloads of automobiles were received in Medford during the month of March, four carloads have been received in this city during April, so far, and three more are on the road. It will be claimed by some that it is a reckless investment in luxury, but when it is discovered that many of these machines are being bought by farmers and orchardists who need them in the general expedition of their business operations, it may be said to indicate, at least, a sturdy confidence that the hard-times period has reached its conclusion on the Pacific coast.

"While mutton, beef and pork are soaring in price and the prospects are for continued advance," said a local business man today, "it may be well to bear in mind that eggs are now and will probably remain to be for some time yet the cheapest and most wholesome meat food obtainable. The country is being searched for marketable livestock for the markets, which have become eager even for a nominal supply. It is predicted that meat prices will soon be the highest ever exacted in this country. Set the hens now, while eggs are cheap, and increase the output of fries and broilers. At the same time," continued the business man, "take care that the increase in the winter layers shall be proportionate with the increased demand for eggs during the winter season."

Postage stamps at De Voe's. "Speaking of lime as a soil stimulant," said Manager J. C. The soil was the same on the entire level tract. He concluded to try lime as a stimulant. He limed the middle acre, leaving the acre each side of it just as it was and had been for years. Each outside acre produced 19 bushels of wheat, while the limed acre produced 47 bushels. The demonstration was convincing, so far as it applied to that type of soil. The land, although in a lime country, had been cultivated for many years."
