

ARMY AND TARIFF DEMANDED IN G. O. P. PLATFORM, INDIANA

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 6.—Drawn along conservative lines and containing a strong endorsement of Charles W. Fairbanks for the presidential nomination, the platform drafted by the resolutions committee in an all-night session was submitted to the state republican convention here today.

The platform denounces the Wilson administration as "inefficient and extravagant," and declares it has "brought in business depression at home and disaster abroad," adding that "such prosperity as has attended the democratic administration has been due almost wholly to war and disaster which prevail in the old world."

The tariff plank demands the re-enactment of a protective tariff at the earliest possible date.

The platform favors a privately owned and operated merchant marine under the American flag and "such preparedness as may be necessary upon land and sea to protect American citizens in their persons and property at home and abroad."

Strict neutrality toward the nations engaged in the European war is also recommended.

The president's Mexican policy is characterized as "weak and indecisive," and states that it has brought "increasing confusion and national humiliation."

Other planks include a condemnation of the "democratic policy of sequestration in the Philippines."

POPE CHAMPIONS BELGIUM'S CAUSE

PARIS, April 6.—The full text of Cardinal Mercier's Lenten pastoral as published at Havre in the Vingtieme Siecle, the official organ of the Belgian government, contains the following additional reference to Pope Benedict:

"The Holy Father sums up his true sentiments toward Belgium in a dedication which he wrote on a portrait for me as follows:

"To our venerated brother, Cardinal Mercier, archbishop of Malines, we give with all our heart the apostolic benediction, assuring him that we are always with him and that we take our part in his sorrows and trials, since his cause is also our cause."

The following phrases of the pastoral are among those to which Governor General Von Bissing took objection in his letter of reproach to the cardinal.

"Conviction, both natural and supernatural, in our final victory, is more deeply than ever anchored in my soul. If it could of any time have been weakened, the assurances given me on the subject by several disinterested and careful observers of the general situation, belonging notably to North and South America, would have served to strengthen it anew."

ALLIES DESTROY A SUBMARINE

QUEENSTOWN, April 6.—The British steamer Zeat has been torpedoed without warning east of Pastnet. Forty-eight members of her crew are missing and are supposed to have been drowned. Two men were killed, Captain Martin and nine of the crew have been landed here.

PARIS, April 6.—A German submarine was sunk today by a squadron of French and British warships, the ministry of marine announced tonight. The crew of the submarine was captured.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The American consul at Havre reported today that in the sinking of the Norwegian steamer Haus presumably by a submarine, four persons perished, but that no Americans were aboard.

UNCERTAINTIES OF OREGON HIGHWAYS

SALEM, Or., April 6.—The unstable qualities of highways in the wild parts of the west were explained in a letter mailed today by State Engineer John H. West to the department of agriculture at Washington. Mystified federal officials had asked him to account for the disappearance of 320 miles of highway in Lincoln county and for the addition of 2000 miles in Malheur county, as indicated in the last report from Oregon.

Mr. Lewis forwarded the query to the counties concerned. R. H. Miller, of the Lincoln county court, explained that the previous report was made when the tide was out and there was 320 miles of good highway along the beach. Unfortunately, when the last report was made, the tide was in.

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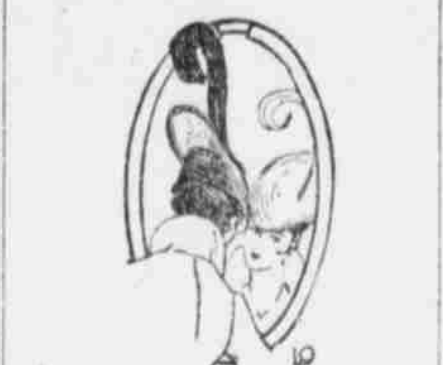
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
