PRIZES OFFERED HOME INDUSTRY

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PROBE TORPEDOING OF STR. SUSSEX

PARIS, April 7.—Lieutenant Commander William R. Sayles and First Lieutenant Bernard L. Smith, naval attaches of the American embassy, have returned from the tour of investigation of the destruction of the channel steamer Sussex, which took them first to Boulogne, then to naval headquarters at Toulon and thence to the British admiralty in London. Fragments of metal found on board the Sussex being compared with bronze torpedoes used by the Germans and now in possession of the French and British naval authorities. Their trip concludes the inquiries carried out by the Paris embassy. The results of these include fourteen affidavits made by American passengers on the Sussex and a technical report by the naval attaches on the nature of the explosive instrument.

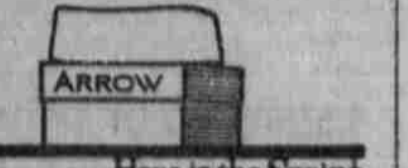
