WASHINGTON, April 17.—Acting Secretary Newton of the treasury, announced today that he had decided to test the availability of airplanes as coast guard service auxiliaries in locating derelicts and vessels in distress.

Sealed proposals, addressed to the undersigned at Jacksonville, Oregon, and endorsed "Sealed Bid for Re-paving Road" for repaving a county road between Medford and Jacksonville, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications on file in the county surveyor's office, over the Medford National bank building.
