

BURTON OF OHIO SEEKING PRESIDENCY SPEAKS TONIGHT

Hon. Theodore F. Burton, United States senator from Ohio and a republican candidate for the presidential nomination, who is hurriedly touring the southwestern states and Oregon in the interest of his candidacy and the republican party, arrived with his party in Medford Monday morning and will appear at the Natorium at 8 o'clock tonight in an address on national issues. Accompanying the senator are ex-Congressman Ralph D. Cole, of Finley, Ohio, T. B. Everts, of Cleveland, O., C. C. Bryant, traveling passenger agent of the "Big Four Route" with headquarters in San Francisco, and O. C. Bortmeyer, state manager in Oregon for the Burton campaign, accompanied by Edgar Winter, Mr. Bortmeyer's private secretary.

Senator Burton left Cleveland, O., on April 7, and has delivered eight addresses en route, five in New Mexico, two in Arizona and one at Los Angeles, California.

Mexican Policy Prominent
In New Mexico and Arizona there appeared naturally to be special interest in the present administration's Mexican policy, and to that issue Senator Burton devoted the major part of his addresses in those states. At Los Angeles, in response to an invitation by the Realty board to a noonday luncheon, the senator discussed more specifically the tariff issue and the platform pledges of the democratic party as applied to the present administration. From this date to the conclusion of the tour the senator will probably discuss more particularly the partisan issues now engrossing the attention of the people.

The first address by Senator Burton in Oregon will be delivered tonight in this city. The second stop will be at Eugene, the next at Portland and he will probably extend his itinerary to Baker before his return to California to fill an engagement before the Oakland chamber of commerce. From there the distinguished party will begin the return east, stopping for an address at Reno, Nevada, and at Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Burton's "Pork Barrel" Speech
In the matter of effective public service perhaps no one instance in the senatorial career of Theodore F. Burton is more generally remembered than his "Pork Barrel" address to the United States senate in September, 1914. It was in opposition to what the senator conceived to be an excessive rivers and harbors appropriation bill and the senator talked for 24 hours continuously, at the conclusion of which the appropriation was reduced from \$52,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

Since Senator Burton's return from South America and particularly since May 14, 1914, he has delivered a great many non-partisan addresses in 40 states of the union. His addresses from this date on throughout the campaign will be confined largely to the partisan issues between the two great parties.

Senator Burton's address tonight in this city will be preceded by a noonday luncheon at the University club. An informal reception will be tendered at the Hotel Medford at 7:15 o'clock this evening, followed by the program at the Natorium at 8 o'clock sharp, under the auspices of the Lincoln club.

A song by a mixed quartet will open the program, following which Mrs. E. H. Hanley will deliver an address on behalf of the ladies. After a musical number, Attorney Gus Newbury will introduce Senator Burton.

C. M. Thomas, president of the Lincoln club, will preside at the meeting tonight.

Of course the Buckeye club will be prominently present.

FINAL NOTE UPON UNDERSEA WAR IS READY FOR SENDING

WASHINGTON, April 17.—President Wilson late today completed the communication to Germany on submarine warfare and sent for Chairman Stone of the senate foreign relations committee for a conference probably tonight. This action was in line with the president's policy of keeping congress informed of the progress of the negotiations.

The document was characterized by officials today as being very positive in tone and they believe that only a prompt acquiescence by Germany in the position taken by the United States can prevent a break in diplomatic relations.

Unofficial dispatches from Berlin indicating that the German government is ready to meet the United States more than half way, it was said, will not change the course of the American government decided on at Friday's cabinet meeting.

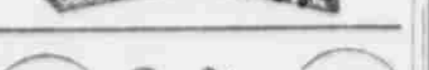

HOLD RAILROADS RESPONSIBLE FOR EMPLOYEES SAFETY

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The supreme court today so construed the various federal safety appliance acts that all employees—no matter whether engaged at the time in intra-state or inter-state commerce—may recover damages for injuries occurring through failure of inter-state commerce railroads to comply with the safety appliance laws. It was re-

garded as a precedent-making decision, giving safety appliance laws a scope far greater than the federal employees' liability law. The first employees' liability law was even enacted years ago because it applied to employees engaged in intra-state commerce as well as those in inter-state commerce.

The decision was announced in the suit of A. H. Rigby, a brakeman of the Texas and Pacific railroad, injured by a defective ladder on a car marked "bad order" and left standing in the Marshall, Texas, yard for repairs. It was necessary for Rigby to take the car over the main line to the shops for repairs.

The court held all that was necessary was that the railroad be engaged in inter-state commerce for the federal law to apply to all their acts regarding safety.

CONTRACT LET FOR EPISCOPAL CHURCH

The contract has been signed and ground will be broken Tuesday morning for the new St. Mark's church to be built at the corner of North Oakdale and Fifth street. The church will be of gray brick veneer with white stone trimmings and will seat 200 people. The size will be 44x48 feet over all. Major Geo. Butts is the architect. The contractor, Mr. Jansen, promises to rush the work of building and expects to finish the church in about two months.
