The following circular letter has been given to every school child eleven years of age or under. It is intended to interest the parents in the Junior Thrift exhibit which is to be held next fall.

Attend the meeting at the library Friday at 7:30 and hear Mr. Hillis and Judge Kelly tell what this will mean to you and your children. There will be an interesting musical program also.

The Thrift movement is at present engaging the attention of parents and teachers all over America. The future economic conditions of the United States demand largely upon how well we teach our boys and girls to save and utilize their spare moments, both in and out of school. The Parent-Teacher organizations are launching a movement known as the "Junior Thrift Exhibit" which intends to foster a desire on the part of boys and girls to utilize their spare time in doing something both useful and profitable to themselves and family. Will you not be willing to provide a way whereby your boy or girl may be profitably employed this summer?

The purpose of the movement is designed to awaken in the parent a deeper interest in the mental and physical activities of the child and at the same time show the value to the child of the opportunity to develop these activities. It will stimulate originality, ingenuity, industry and thrift in your child.

Requirements

- 1. All children sixteen years of age or under may exhibit some object they have constructed or produced with their own hands.
2. The products or savings made in gardening, fruit raising, raising poultry, wood work, toys, electrical and mechanical apparatus, printing arts and crafts, cooking, sewing, music, millinery and pets may be exhibited.
3. All work must be done outside of school hours.
4. The work is not competitive.
5. Advice may be obtained from any one of our sources.

RUSSIA CLOSES NORTHERN PORTS

NEW YORK, April 21.—The Russian government's decree closing the port of Archangel to all ship cargoes except those exclusively for use by the government, has been broadened to include all White sea and Arctic ports, it was made known today at the office of the Russian commercial attaché here.

No official explanation has been received in New York as to reason for the decree. One interpretation advanced in marine circles is that the order has to do with the movement of Russian troops to France. It was said here today that the Russian embassy in Washington will soon issue a statement indicating just what ship movements to Russia are to be permitted under the decree.

WILLIAM OF WEID RULES IN ALBANIA

PARIS, April 21.—A Bavas dispatch from Corin says that Prince William of Weid, recently reported to have been reinstated as ruler of Albania, has issued a proclamation at the Basso, appealing to the people of the country to submit to the Teutonic ally and enroll in the army. The proclamation was signed by the prince and an Austrian officer, Sibir-Haduf.

ROSEBURG MAN NAMED AS PLOTTER BY VON DER GOLTZ

ROSEBURG, Or., April 21.—Geo. Schindmacher, living at Edinshower River farm, near here, who was named in the sworn statement made by Horst Von Der Goltz, which was made public by the British government last night, as being one of the persons alleged to be implicated in bomb plots, is a German chemist.

Much of his time here has been devoted to chemical experiments. These experiments, he said, were for the purpose of discovering a cheap poultry feed.

Schindmacher laughed at the idea of his being implicated in bomb plots. He says his name probably is on the list of Germans in America who are subject to military duty. This, and the fact that he is an expert chemist, he said, may have resulted in attempts to implicate him.

During the three years of his residence here he has been engaged in the poultry business, but recently gave up this business and today was engaged in testing down several small buildings that he had erected. He stated today that he had lost a fortune of \$50,000 in a libel suit in Manitoba.
