

### COAST COUNTIES CO-OPERATING FOR NEEDED RAILWAY

F. E. Peaslack, secretary of the Klamath Development company, writes from that city to Secretary Latta of the Medford Commercial club, to the effect that "a great deal of enthusiasm has been aroused in Humboldt county over the proposed railroad from Medford toward Humboldt bay and that the association is doing all in its power to assist the league formed in February at Yreka by all of the counties concerned."

Representatives of that company have been to all of the large towns in the territory affected and, therefore, interested in the proposed road and secured from all of the civic organizations letters and resolutions concerning their interest in the plans of the league, which known on record as the California and Oregon Development association. This data has been turned over to the Humboldt county supervisors. It is Mr. Peaslack's opinion that the latter will appropriate \$1000 by way of promoting the work necessary to be done to complete preliminary arrangements for a definite plan of action.

Word comes from other counties in the effect that everything possible is being done to get the matter in hand in shape for progressive development of all of the plans involved in the project.

Grants-Pass, at which place a club will be formed Saturday night, has suggested that a picnic dinner be held in the grove on the river bank at that place at a date when weather conditions shall be agreeable. However, that is only a suggestion. The club will determine soon where their first big meeting shall be held.

### CALLS ROOSTERS NOISY, NEEDLESS CITY NUISANCES

To the Editor: I want to thank you for giving space to an article by an unscrupulous citizen, some days ago, on the subject of noisy nuisances in the heart of the city. The noise of people who maintain such nuisances, however, are not easily banished, so, with your permission, I want to add a word or two of advice for abatement of that type of unnecessary torture.

I live in an excellent part of the city among good neighbors. There is one exception to the latter characterization. One neighbor keeps four or five pens of chickens. It is a commercial poultry yard. Its products are sold in the form of eggs. Roosters are not necessary to the production of eggs. And yet half a dozen brazen chanticleers are kept with the flocks of hens, presumably to make a noise. The noise is not a part of the commercial product of the yards. It is worthless as an asset of the business. It possesses only the character of a nuisance.

An elderly lady, almost an invalid, is one of my nearest neighbors. She is a victim of this nuisance, as are all of the other neighbors, but it imposes upon her an especial sense of distress. For hours in the after part of the night she cannot sleep on account of the chorus of clarion crows emitted by these roosters from 7 till 7 in the morning. It is an outrage. On this one lady's account it ought to be abated. Appeal has been made frequently to the woman who owns the chicken yard under our windows. She ignores them.

I am another victim. I am a light sleeper. I can't help that. The brazen noise of this bunch of roosters is wrecking my nerves. I have moved my bed into a far corner of my residence, but I cannot escape it.

Other neighbors have complained sorely of this nuisance. We have held councils of war. Violence has been suggested. We have been placed squarely on the defensive. It seems that we have no legal defense. No ordinance has ever been passed declaring that sort of thing a nuisance. The council is urged to pass such a law. It would be a most virtuous provision which would protect the indifference to the noise and quietude of a great majority of our people.

It seems to me, to be perfectly shameful that a neighbor will maintain such a mean type of coarseness when it brings him nothing, unless it be the frantic satisfaction of causing distress to others. It shows a meanly contemptible nature to do such a thing. There is absolutely no excuse for maintaining a levy of cocks to crow the hour of the night away to the great amusement of mind of many neighbors. Such a person cannot be Christianly in character—not even a good citizen who will knowingly create such disorder.

If you will print this second protest, you will oblige a number of readers. It may do some good.

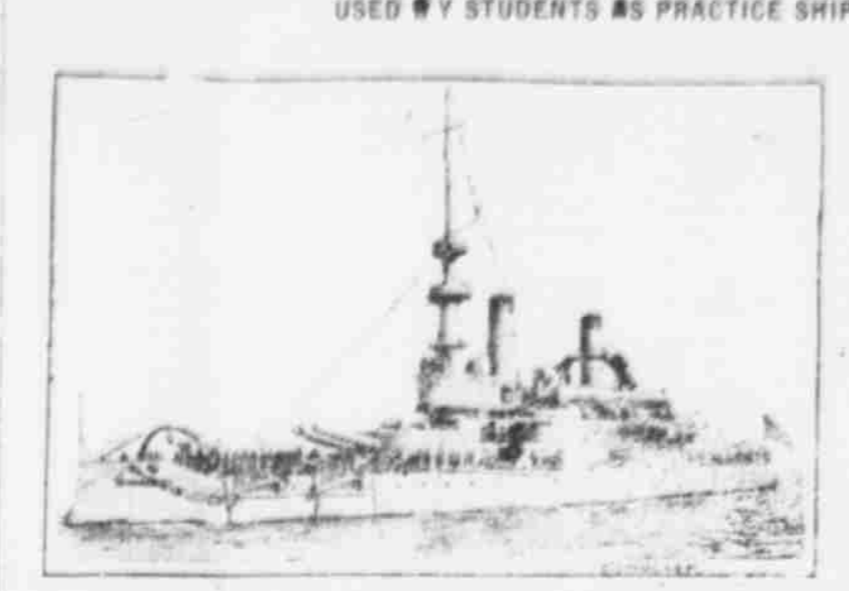

### WOOD ORCHARD HEATERS A SUCCESS

Joseph Schultz' wood heater for orchards in time of frost was demonstrated on the vacant section of the right-of-way in front of the Mail Tribune office Wednesday night. Four heaters were placed as it would be necessary to place them in an orchard. Two cubic feet of wood were supplied for each heater. The radiation of heat was found to be equal to that given off by five gallons of oil to each smudge pot set in the same manner, the cost of the wood being less than half of the cost of the oil. The degree of combustion was almost perfect, leaving no dirty, choking soot to be distributed in the vicinity of the heaters. Dillon B. Hill and other orchardists have tried these heaters and pronounce them far ahead of anything yet tried as a substitute for the oil smudge-pots.

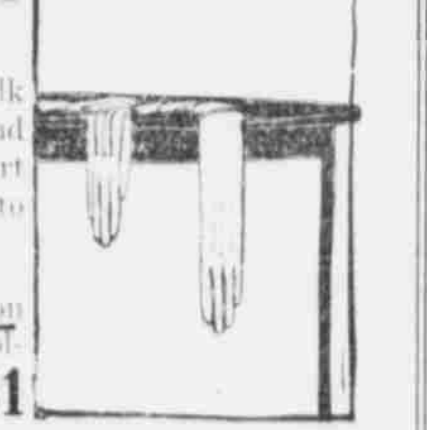
