

ERICKSON NUPTIALS SOCIETY EVENT AT SAN FRANCISCO CAL.

The following account of the marriage of Martin Erickson of Medford, supervisor of the Crater Lake national forest, and Miss Gertrude Hanna at San Francisco Friday evening, April 28, is published in Saturday's issue, with a two-column portrait of the bride:

"Miss Gertrude Hanna, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard J. Hanna, became the wife of Martin Ludwig Erickson, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Erickson of South Dakota, last night, the ceremony taking place at the Hanna home on Laguna street. The Rev. Josiah Sibley of the Presbyterian church officiated. Afterward there was a dinner dance in the ballroom, the guests enjoying dancing between courses."

Both of the young people are newcomers to San Francisco. The Hanna family came to southern California from Franklin, Pa., and within the past year decided to make their permanent home in San Francisco. Mr. Erickson, who is a Yale graduate, is in the government forestry service, with headquarters at Medford, Ore., where the young couple will reside.

"The wedding was one of the handsomest seen in San Francisco in a long time. The decorations in the drawing room, where the service was read, were all in deep blue and pink. The room is in the French style, rather high-ceiled, and therefore lends itself particularly well to a generous massing of flowers.

The flowers used were pink roses, both the Cceil Bremen and the larger varieties with quantities of lovely blue Diaphenous or larkspur. The blue flowers were the first of the season and are unusually large and rich-colored this year, and come in all shades of blue, from deep marine to a pinkish lavender, blending with the luscious rose tints of the contrasting decorations. There was a hedge of the flowers about the room, almost covering the walls, and about the altar were columns holding quantities of the roses and blue flowers. The altar was massed with vases and baskets holding roses.

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ROMANTIC STORY OF DISCOVERY OF BLUE LEDGE MINE

RAILROAD SURVEY OVER JACKSONVILLE HILL IS INSPECTED

SACRAMENTO, May 2.—The story of the discovery of Blue Ledge mine, in Siskiyou county, as revealed today in the application of the St. Albans Mining company for permission to sell stock for the further development of the mine, reads like a movie scenario. "Twas back in 1900, the story relates, when a man from Crescent City, Cal.—a sort of prospector—was roaming the streets of San Francisco. He saw a sign "Spiritualist—Reads your past, present and future."

The prospector decided to take a chance. The spiritualist told him where his fortune awaited him. She described in detail a mountainous bit of country which the prospector recognized as being located near Crescent City.

"High up in the mountains there is an eagle's nest," said the prophet, "and directly under the nest is a mine of gold, copper and silver."

She then told him how he would come in contact with a trapper who would direct him to the eagle's nest. The prospector returned to Crescent City and subsequently came across that trapper. The eagle's nest was pointed out, and blamed if there wasn't a mine under it.

The prophetess was "off" in only one detail—the mine contained veins of gold, copper and iron instead of gold, copper and silver.

The prospector after working the mine in a small way, sold his interest for \$100, and later the St. Albans Mining company secured possession,

Jacksonville hill has an altitude practically the same as that of Copper, five miles this side of the Blue Ledge mine.

Members of the party whose experience and general fund of information about such matters give weight to their statements regard the proposition as one easy of solution. Many of them were surprised at the inviting configuration of the region observed.

That the cost of construction will be nominal appeared to be the expressed judgment of all.

Councilman Keene, Delroy Getchel and Harry Stoekman did not go the entire distance to the summit.

Agent Rosenbaum of the Southern Pacific, who was suffering from a wrench back, remained at the car to protect H. B. Patterson from the crowding "varmints" of the foothills.

The latter declared that he could see the two and a half miles from there to the summit of Jacksonville hill on foot.

The object of the excursion was to obtain a personal view of the proposed route of the Bullis extension project, from the terminus of the present time to the Blue Ledge mine. The people of Medford will vote on the \$300,000 bond proposition on May 23, for the purpose of promoting the extension of the present line to the Blue Ledge district.

The city officials desired to view the grade possibilities and obtain a general view of the configuration of the foothills of that region.

Very Simple Problem

H. B. Stoner, Olen Arnsperger and W. T. Beveridge, practical engineers, accompanied the party. Their opinions were formed merely on a superficial view of the territory, the canyons, the formation and the distance necessary to travel to secure a 3 per cent grade.

In the opinion of these engineers, no engineering problem of serious nature is presented at any point on the line of the proposed extension. Nor will the construction work be heavy at any point. Most of it is a steam shovel proposition.

It was the consensus of opinion that the summit of the Jacksonville hill, altitude about 400 feet, can be reached easily on a light 3 per cent grade, with compensating curves.

The proposed Bullis extension follows the west canyon wall of Jackson creek, instead of the east side, as did the Kyle survey. The latter is rougher in contour and presents a heavier class of construction work. The west side is by far the better.
