LEADS IN WAR-MAKING (Continued from page one)

Auto Manufacturers Automobiles can be manufactured in the United States at the rate of one in one month, making possible at about 5000 per month, motor cars at 5000 per month. There are now about 1,000,000 motor cars, 15,000 motor trucks and 100,000 motorcycles in the United States. At a rate of a million new motor cars, 150,000 motor trucks, 100,000 motorcycles and 1,000,000 motor cars, the United States will be able to supply the world's demand for automobiles.

The national wealth of the United States is estimated by the War Department of the Army at \$100,000,000,000. The only state which has a full complement of factories available for war purposes is New Jersey, which has 1,000 such factories.

The greatest lack in American resources for war purposes is the absence of potash of which this country normally imports \$17,000,000 worth from European sources and the only substitute for which is not the best in the world. Another lack is aluminum and coal tar products of which this country is short \$1,000,000,000 worth over from European sources.
