FRUIT LOSS BY FROST REDUCED BY CLOSE EXAMINATION

An average of 1000 acres of fruit, as estimated by the orchardists themselves, was taken yesterday by J. Cecil Allen of the local weather bureau and found to be just 25 per cent.

To determine what the estimated loss would be taken into account the fact that the orchardists of the valley have this year a stand of 200 to 300 per cent on the trees. A considerable percentage of this would be lost, happily, to be sure, by the normal dropping of fruit. The frost will take off all of the smaller fruits and, no doubt, some of the good stand. But it will not be necessary to do a great deal of thinning.

Due to Freak Conditions.

The fruit orchards in the foothill districts and on the higher levels in the valley are practically unimpaired. These areas and streaks in the valley where the losses are greatest cannot be said to be frost pockets. It was a very freakish condition of much more than ordinary duration.

Observer Allen's estimate is based on a careful investigation in all parts of the valley. He and his party found the worst and the best among all of the orchards. Individual estimates were added together and that sum divided by the number of acres involved. That gave the average per cent of 25.

Horticultural Commissioner A. C. Allen states that while some orchards lost almost their entire yield, the great bulk were not damaged at all and he states the total loss will not exceed 20 or 25 per cent.

Loss Estimates Agree.

J. C. Barnes and W. J. Hill traveled 150 miles Monday and Tuesday among the orchards of the valley and foothills and made careful examinations everywhere. Their estimate is about the same as Mr. Allen's. Some of the orchards on the lower levels, where it was assumed that loss would be greatest, were not injured perceptibly, while others, where it was thought little damage could be done, were injured very severely.

Dr. V. Truogwald visited and carefully examined the Westland orchards in 1000 acres east of town. He reports no loss. Cherries and other delicate fruits were not affected. Close examination was made of samples of the fruit brought to town. They showed no injury.

The May 10th event of the schools of Medford, which will be held Friday, May 19, promises to be a profitable affair among the school children and their parents. Liquor Pays Third of Federal Bill.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 10.—One-third of the federal government's revenue in 1914 was derived from the liquor industry, declared Secretary Joseph Debar today in his annual report to the twenty-first annual convention of the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' association of America in session here. Of this amount, said Mr. Debar, \$226,209,000 was received from internal revenue and \$19,200,000 from import duties on liquor.
