Supervisor Peterson Gets Busy
Mr. Peterson, school supervisor, after writing letters to the various candidates for school superintendent, addressed a letter to the rural teachers against my candidacy for county school superintendent because I stood for "the elimination of county school superintendents."

The system has cost the county at least \$2000 a year for the past five years and is one of the causes of placing the superintendent's office as the third highest in expense in the state. The "force" certainly has been active these past three months. Will Mr. Peterson commend what the two supervisors, county superintendent, and office deputy have accomplished these past five years?

The law makes provision for the elimination of superintendents by the county educational board (county superintendent and four members appointed by him) I shall deem it my duty to ascertain the will of the people in this matter and pledge myself to follow it.

JERRY NUNAN'S FUNERAL TO BE HELD FRIDAY MORNING

Jeremiah (Jerry) Nunan, aged 77 years, for forty-five years one of Jackson county's best beloved citizens, and for over thirty years in the mercantile business in Jacksonville, committed suicide Wednesday afternoon between 4 and 5 o'clock near the home of his son, Charles Nunan, near the county seat, by shooting himself in the head with a .38-caliber revolver. Temporary insanity, due to failing health, is held responsible for the act. Ten days ago the aged pioneer came from San Leandro, a suburb of Oakland, Cal., where he has been making his home with his daughter, for a visit with friends and relatives here.

The body was found by Frank Bybee of Jacksonville, who called at the Nunan home to see his old friend, after looking after a flock of sheep ranged in a nearby pasture. The prostrate form was lying beneath an oak tree, in front of the home. Bybee's first impression was that heart failure had stricken the pioneer. He telephoned for aid.

Careful Preparations.
Nunan shot himself in the back of the head, and two shots were fired, but whether the second shot was due to relaxation of the muscles or not is not known. Careful preparations had been made for the best rush deed. A mirror had been hung on the oak tree, and before this the pioneer mercantile stood to fan out the flicker of life. A basin of water also stood near the tree. He left no note. All the family were away at the time of the tragedy. The bullet's course was downward through the brain, causing almost instant death. Deputy Sheriff Harper took charge pending the arrival of the coroner.

Jerry Nunan was known up to a few years ago to every man in Jackson county. He was born in Ireland, came to the county seat about forty-five years ago and started in the salubrious business with a man named Judd. After conducting this business successfully for years, he embarked in the general mercantile business under the firm name of Taylor-Nunan company. He owned considerable property near Jacksonville, and upon the property now owned by Colonel H. H. Stevens built a \$10,000 home, elegantly furnished. Two or three years ago he moved to California, where he resided with his wife and daughters.

Funeral Friday.
He is survived by his wife, Della Nunan; two daughters, Mrs. Josephine Russell and Miss Fannie Nunan, of Oakland, Cal., and one son, Charles Nunan, of Jacksonville. The funeral will be held Friday morning at 10 o'clock from the Jacksonville Catholic church.

Coroner Poff took charge of the body, but an inquest was not thought necessary.
The news of the death of the beloved pioneer caused a feeling of gloom over a wide circle of friends and acquaintances throughout southern Oregon.
