## BOND ELECTION TUESDAY TO VOTE BLUE LEDGE ROAD

The election on Tuesday, May 23, in this city to authorize and empower the council to borrow \$300,000 to build the Blue Ledge railroad should call out a full expression from the property owners of the city on that important question. It is necessary, therefore, that all should have the right to vote. This they will possess if they are legally registered.

Anyone who has not registered since the January election at the city hall must register on the morning of the Tuesday election. This registration is especially provided for. It is a simple and quick process. Anyone who desires to register then will need only one witness, a freeholder in the city. That will make the registration permanent, under the new registration ordinance. But all should remember that the registration for county and state elections has nothing to do with the city registration and city elections. For all city elections the registration must be made at the city hall and it must have been made either on the day of January 11, 1916, or since that date. Registration at the city hall on Tuesday, therefore, will be easy and necessary to those who have not registered under the new city law since January 11.

ENGLISH COAST RAIDED BY THREE GERMAN SEAPLANES

LONDON, May 20.—Three German seaplanes made a raid on the English coast last night, a British official announcement today states. One of the aircraft was brought down off the Belgian coast. The seaplanes dropped thirty-seven bombs, wounding one soldier and two civilians.

The statement says: "A hostile air raid was carried out on the east coast of Kent last night by at least three seaplanes. The raiders made the English coast a few minutes past 2 o'clock this morning. The seaplanes then turned north and dropped a dozen explosive bombs over the Isle of Thanet. Some windows were broken. Otherwise there were no casualties and no other damage."

"Two other seaplanes turned south and dropped twenty-five explosive bombs over southeastern Kent. In one town a few bombs took effect, one soldier being killed, one woman and a seaman being injured. A public house was wrecked and several houses damaged. The remaining bombs caused no casualties or damage."

"The raiders all made off as soon as their bombs were discharged. One of the raiding seaplanes was brought down by a naval patrol off the Belgian coast this morning."

## CRATER LAKE ROAD GETS APPROPRIATION OF \$50,000

WASHINGTON, May 20.—Sundry civil bill reported today carries one hundred and sixty-nine thousand seven hundred and sixty dollars for our district including eight thousand for operating expenses of Crater Lake park and fifty thousand for road which its engineers estimate for one year's work. ## FRENCH ATTACKS ON VERDUN FRONT DECLARED FAILURE

BERLIN, May 20, via London.—The failure of repeated attacks by the French on the German positions between Hauscourt and Esnes, on the Verdun front, was announced today by the war office. A patrol operation in the Argonne resulted in heavy losses for the French.

The text of today's statement follows:

"Western front: In the Argonne, German patrols penetrated the enemy's second line after a few explosions. They observed great losses in killed and wounded in the enemy's positions and returned with a few prisoners."

"Repeated attacks upon our new positions on both sides of the Hauscourt Esnes high road were again easily repulsed."

"Five enemy aeroplanes were brought down, one by our infantry fire southeast of Vailley, the other four in aerial battles northeast of Aubreville, on the southern edge of the Hesse wood, near Avocourt, and due east of Verdun."

"Our aviators attacked enemy ships on the Flanders coast, enemy shelters, the aerodrome and the railway

station near Dunkirk and military establishments at St. Pol, Dixmude, Poperinghe, Amiens, Chalons and Suippes, with good results."

"Eastern front: In the neighborhood of Smorgon a German aviator brought down a Russian aeroplane during a battle."

PORTLAND, May 19.—Prohibitionists of Oregon in state nominating convention here today put out a ticket which included ex-Governor

Oswald West, democrat of Portland, as candidate for representative in congress for the third district, and Mark Weatherford, of Albany, democrat as candidate for representative from the first district. Other nominations included the following:

Secretary of state, O. V. White of Linn county; supreme court justice, C. B. Bright of Wasco county and E. A. Knott, of Yamhill county; food and dairy commissioner, A. G. Rumpel of Polk county.
