MOLLIE TOWNE NAMED FOR EVERY OFFICE ON BALLOT

Miss Marian N. Towne is evidently one of the most popular persons in Jackson county, and her name was written in on the ballots of all three parties for numerous offices. On the democratic ballot, she received votes for every office from vice president to constable. She was named for congress, for secretary of state, for supreme court justice, for dairy commissioner, for circuit judge, for representative, for joint representative, for county commissioner, for county clerk, county treasurer, coroner and constable. For the legislature she was nominated, her name being written upon 248 ballots for the office. For joint representative, she received 12 votes.

The names of 74 different candidates were written in for county surveyor, Brown receiving both the democratic and republican nominations.

The names of 69 person were written in for county commissioner, 29 of them by the democrats and 40 by the republicans, despite the fact that George Owens name was printed upon the ballot. Joe Beeman, of Gold Hill got a plurality of the democrats, his name being written in oftenest.

Henry Ford got one democratic vote for president, Woodrow Wilson getting the balance. It is suspected that this Ford vote was cast by Bill Gates, who helped put the Ford in Medford. Thomas Watson of Georgia got three votes for vice president, showing that the A. P. A.'s have some strength locally.

Dr. J. M. Keene received his usual scattering vote for both constable and coroner, showing that the old guard is still loyal.

LANSING DENIES CANARD CIRCULATED ABOUT RESIGNATION

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Secretary Lansing attended the cabinet meeting today after having been confined to his home by an attack of indigestion for nearly a week. The secretary said he had been able to do little work during his illness, the effects of which he still showed when he arrived at the White House.

The state department made this statement regarding published reports that Secretary Lansing was contemplating resigning from the cabinet because of differences with President Wilson.

"This story is part of a propaganda, the deliberate purpose of which is to create an appearance of dissension in the government, which does not exist. The story was first born last February or March, when the relations between the United States and Germany were somewhat strained. It was sent to Berlin by wireless in press dispatches. It was picked up in transit in an allied country and subsequently published there. In that way the state department became cognizant of the story and instructions were sent to Berlin to watch out for it. Apparently the persons responsible found we were prepared for the story because it never was published in Germany. The directors of this propaganda have now taken advantage of Secretary Lansing's illness to put out the story again."

Mr. Lansing personally denied that he was considering resigning.

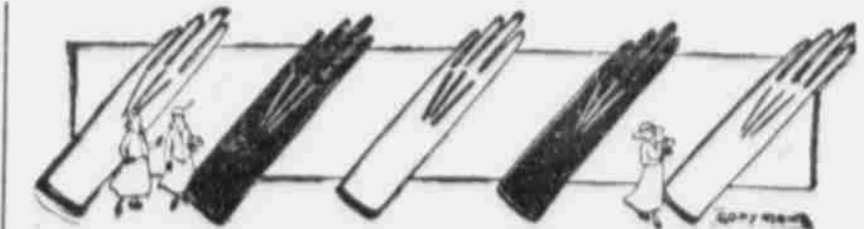
