GRANT LIFE CONVICT PLEA FOR INDEBTEDNESS

PORTLAND, May 27.—Judge R. G. Morrow ruled in circuit court today that civil death, which is the status of a man serving a life sentence in a state prison, does not prevent the convicted from instituting the aid of the state courts to enforce a judgment. For that reason he refused to order the release of James L. Level, who is being held in the Multnomah county jail for debt.

A judgment for \$1034 was obtained against James L. Level by a cousin John M. Level, now serving a life sentence in San Quentin penitentiary for murder. The judgment decree states there was fraud in the decision and this week attorneys representing the convict caused an execution to be issued against the body of James L. Level who was arrested.

The effect of the decision is to keep James L. Level in jail pending payment of the judgment.
