GUILTY OF TREASON SAYS T. R.

German-American alliance regards their action as unsatisfactory from the standpoint not of the United States, but of Germany. These branches of the alliance openly take the ground that they intend to shape American policies in the interest, not of the United States, but of Germany.

"The German-American alliance of Pennsylvania, for instance, as reported in the public press, states that it intends to show the leaders of the national conception that they have dealt with a united German-American vote." Such a statement represents moral treason to the republic. Branches of the German-American alliance in other parts of the country have used practically the same language. The alliance has put forth no program affecting America. The program on which it wishes American citizens to vote is one affecting Germany and only Germany.

"If France had subjugated Belgium I would condemn her just as strongly as I have condemned Germany. If British war craft had sunk German passenger vessels and taken the lives of hundreds of American

citizens I would condemn her just as strongly as I have condemned Germany."
