LUMBER YARDS OF SAN FRANCISCO CLOSED BY STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—San Francisco's lumber yards were closed today as a result of the longshoremen's strike. Lumber dealers representing virtually the entire local trade, having decided they did not have enough stock to carry on their business and would be unable to secure more until the longshoremen unloaded the lumber boats. The entire building industry of the city will be tied up and several thousand men will be thrown out of work following the closing of the yards, the lumber men announced, as there is not enough lumber in the city to carry on any construction work for more than a few days. Several plans will still also shut down.

Several attempts were made yesterday to remove cargoes from lumber boats with minimum labor, but the men were persuaded to leave their jobs.

The second day of the longshoremen's strike found practically all the coast shipping tied up. One union official, E. H. Foley, secretary of the striking Riggers' and Stevedores' union, declared last night the situation looked well and that the strike would be over in a few days. Another official, however, J. J. Foley, president of the union, who is directing the entire strike, said he saw no chance of a settlement in the near future.

News of the titanic naval battle in the North sea, caused considerable excitement in this city, and wild reports were scattered about the losses. One news service reported that the British fleet had been destroyed by over 200 German submarines.

TAKE WEEK TO ANSWER CARRANZA'S INSOLENT DEMAND

WASHINGTON, June 2.—A week or more will be taken by administration officials to frame a reply to General Carranza's last note threatening war if American troops are retained in Mexico, it was said today. The usual cabinet meeting was cancelled, since President Wilson was not to return until late today from Annapolis, where he went to attend commencement exercises at the naval academy.

The war department's plans for maintaining General Pershing's column in Mexico were unchanged.

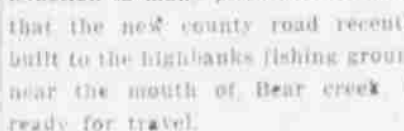

COMPENSATION BILL FOR FEDERAL EMPLOYEES

WASHINGTON, June 2.—With a unanimous report from the judiciary committee recommending its passage, the Sutherland federal employees accident compensation bill to supplant the existing liability law was submitted today to the senate.

The benefits of the law would be extended, from hazardous employments only to all government employees. The new bill eliminates all questions of fault or misconduct except in cases of suicide or intoxication.
