

SAILORS DESCRIBE TEUTONIC NAVAL LOSSES COLOSSAL

LONDON, June 5.—German sailors, rescued by Scandinavian steamers, described the Teutonic losses in the Jutland battle as colossal, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, a large number of the crew of the cruiser Weisbaden and men from several German torpedo boats have been rescued and brought to Copenhagen. They report that many of their comrades, after floating for thirty-six hours on rafts without food or water, drank the sea water, became insane and jumped into the ocean.

The German survivors say that several of their torpedo boats and submarines were captured by the British shells and sank instantly. Bodies of both British and German sailors are beginning to be washed ashore on the coast of Jutland.

Captains of steamers arriving in Scandinavian harbors report that the big German cruisers which were operating along the Courland coast, near Riga, have been withdrawn and that a large squadron of destroyers which had been patrolling the southern Baltic, was not sighted last week.

IOWA PRIMARIES FOR GOVERNOR BEING HELD TODAY

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 5.—Iowa voters who went to the polls today were interested chiefly in the republican primary fight for governor and the question of the adoption of an equal suffrage amendment to the state constitution. It was generally predicted that the women would win their campaign to be granted the ballot.

The democrats and socialists also went to the polls, but as far as the state offices were concerned, there was no opposition to the men chosen by leaders as standard bearers in the coming campaign.

As in former years the keenest contest was expected for the gubernatorial nomination, and this year, with no contests on the democratic side, the republicans have the field almost to themselves.

Candidates include Joseph H. Allen of Pocatontos, state senator; George Cosson of Audubon, present attorney general; W. L. Harding, Sioux City, and Carl Kahnde of Denison.

E. T. Mersdith, a publisher of Des Moines, went before the voters unopposed for the democratic gubernatorial nomination.

J. W. Bennett, of Sioux City, is the socialist candidate for governor, heading a complete state ticket.

LUMBERMEN ASK FEDERAL AID

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Pleading for government aid in placing the timber industry in a state of industrial preparedness, and of achieving a high plane of efficiency, L. C. Boyl of Kansas City, representing the National Lumber Manufacturers association today filed with the federal trade commission the first volume of a brief in the first general investigation by this commission.

The commission has spent months studying the industry's problems, with long hearings in various parts of the country and now the briefs are being prepared. The brief filed in part today is a volume of nearly 150 pages.

The time has come when the dictates of prudence and a better understanding of national need impel a survey to be made of our remaining tree supply to the end that a more rational national policy be worked out," the brief says.
