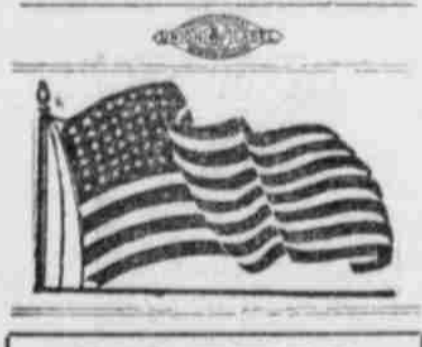

THE TICKET

In naming Hughes and Fairbanks, the republican convention nominated a most respectable, decorous and orthodox ticket—one that will fully meet the approval of the captains of industry of Wall street and the high priests of privilege who believe in things as they are—only more so.

Both the presidential and vice-presidential candidates are of impeccable character. Both have as much red blood as babies. The refrigerating atmosphere of both are well calculated to keep cool the campaign ardor of unruly partisans while insuring place at the political pie-counter for the invisible hands that pull the strings and the purse strings for delivering the goods.

Mr. Hughes is almost as human as Hayes—indeed, resembles that lamented leader in many ways besides whiskers. He is as judicial in temperament as Taft without the latter's weight or breadth.

Hughes was chosen as an alternative for terrible Teddy—not because he was loved more, but because Teddy was loved less. He was the only candidate not identified with either faction of the party in the split of 1912.

Mr. Hughes is untrained and inexperienced in international affairs—and expected to echo the republican platform declarations, as another justice, Alton B. Parker, did for the democratic party in 1908.

Relegating the time-worn tariff to a minor place, the issue of the campaign is to be the artificially created issue of "Americanism"—for with characteristic modesty the republican party has arrogated to itself all the supply of "preparedness" created patriotism on the market—a preparedness for war and munition makers, but not for peace.

The fact that the United States is today the only great nation enjoying peace with honor and prosperity, in progressing politically, socially and commercially (not as fast socially as some of us wish, but still progressing) is the groundwork for attacking and discrediting a president whose patriotism, ability and devotion to American ideals has so largely made it possible.

WHY BOMBAST FAILED TO WIN FOR ROOSEVELT

DEMOCRATS OFF FROM CAPITOL FOR CONVENTION

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Democratic leaders today were departing for the party convention at St. Louis with President Wilson's final suggestions on work of the assembly.

Secretary Baker, on his departure for St. Louis today, was one of the president's personal representatives. Indications were that Homer Cummings, Connecticut national committeeman, was the probable choice of Mr. Wilson as chairman of the democratic national committee.

Strenuous efforts are to be made by party leaders to smooth out differences of opinion within the party and to present a united front in the campaign, it is said.

Despite the departure of many democratic congressmen for St. Louis today, the house took up consideration of the fortifications appropriation bill.

ITALY REJECTS CABINET AND FORMS NEW ONE

ROME, June 12.—The resignation of the Italian cabinet is expected. The minister however will remain in power until the king has taken

his decision regarding the formation of a new cabinet. The government failed to obtain a majority on a vote last night in the chamber of deputies on the budget of the minister of the interior.
