WAUKEGAN, Ill., June 17.—Mrs. Frank Lambert, mother of Marion Lambert, the high school girl, took the stand today as a witness against William Orpet, the young university student, who is on trial here charged with the murder of her daughter. Gowned in deep black, Mrs. Lambert told of her daughter's death and her story of the tragedy sent a thrill of sympathy through the crowded court room. Her testimony was to the effect that Marion was of a very happy disposition, and remained so up to the last moment that she saw her on February 3, the day of her death. Mrs. Lambert also impeached the testimony of Josephine Davis, Marion's chum. Josephine testified that Marion cried on February 6 at her birthday party because of her affection for Orpet, who had transferred his regards to another girl. Mrs. Lambert asserted that the tears were occasioned by the inability of another girl friend to spend the night with her.
