COMMUNITY DAY TO BE BIG EVENT AT COUNTY FAIR

These parties will represent their respective districts in the agricultural and horticultural displays at the Jackson county fair, to be held in Medford, September 13 to 16, inclusive, announces D. M. Lowe, manager of displays, and it is up to the farmers of the different districts to give their support in the way of agricultural and horticultural displays to make the fair what it should be. Other district appointments will follow.

The fair management is going to spare no expense to make the district plan a permanent feature of the fair, and the enthusiasm of the public generally on the plan outlined insures success. The Community Day at the fair promises to bring to Medford one of the largest crowds in the history of the city.

The public schools are heartily in line with the field day movement, and the barbecue feature of the day will add greatly to the enjoyment of the crowds expected on that day. Amusement features for the school children will be added for that day, and reduced admissions for the school children will give all a chance to make it one of the greatest days of the fair.

Mr. Lowe is going to devote special attention to that feature of the fair to make this one of the banner days, to show to the people of the different towns of the valley that the farmers generally are behind the movement for a genuine county fair. There is one feature that they are clamoring for, and that is for a fair grounds with the necessary equipment and shade whereby they may come and camp the week out during the season of the fair to be held in the future, and the association will provide such grounds if the people patronize the fair properly this year, both in exhibits and attendance.

EEMDIJK SUNK BY UNKNOWN TORPEDO

BERLIN, July 20.—The Dutch shipping council has completed its investigation of the explosion which damaged the freighter Eemdiijk, of the Holland-America line, last April. It has decided, the Overseas News Agency says, that the explosion was caused by a torpedo of unknown origin.

The British admiralty announced on April 18 that the Eemdiijk, from Baltimore, with the Dutch colors on her sides "had been torpedoed by an enemy submarine."
